1 MR. BERUFF: Thank you. I'd like to
2 welcome everybody to the 2017-2018 Constitution
3 Revision Committee, commonly known as the CRC.
4 My name is Carlos Beruff and I was appointed by
5 Governor Rick Scott to chair this commission.
6 It's actually pretty neat to talk to people.
7 Listening is a lot more fun than talking. So
8 this is our second meeting. Our first was in
9 Orlando. We had a great turn out and we hope
10 that we have lots of people who want to come
11 and talk to us because this is the most simple
12 process for a citizen to make a difference and
13 change the Constitution of Florida, unique to
14 Florida. I'd to thank Florida International
15 University for hosting us in this wonderful
16 setting and for all the work that you did in
17 preparing for this meeting. I was born in
18 Miami, so I'm pretty familiar with the area. I
19 used to fly airplanes here 50 years ago when
20 there was an airport. A long time ago.

21 We are here to listen to you. That's the
22 only thing we're here to do today. And we will
23 go to these meetings across the state and we'll
24 start formulating what's important to
25 Floridians. The CRC was established -- this

1 is. The third meeting in 40 years. Pretty
2 unique. But I like it because you can cut
3 through all the nonsense and speak to this
4 group of people, these commissioners, who will
5 represent you in anything that makes a
6 difference in the future of Florida like
7 changing the Constitution and -- it all about.
8 If you'd like to submit anything to us, we have
9 an email address and all of those things, but
10 it's sort of much nicer to hear, you know, with
11 your own words. We also have translators here
12 that will -- for those of you who want to speak
13 to us and don't want to speak in English, if
14 you want to speak in other language except
15 Spanish, they will be happy to participate.
16 There's two microphones in the room, one on
17 each aisle. When you come up -- I'm going to
18 call you in groups of three and then we can
19 keep the flow moving. Other than that,
20 welcome. And I am going to be turning it over
21 for the invocation to Commissioner Levesque.

23 someone in Spanish make a clear --

2 we're good. So, for invocation we'll go to
3 Commissioner Levesque.

4 MS. LEVESQUE: Thank you. Dear Heavenly
5 Father, thank you so much for this day. We
6 thank you for your blessings and your mercy and
7 for the health and creation and mind that
8 you've given to us. I ask that you bless the
9 commission hearing this evening, and the
10 commissioners, give us open hearts, give us
11 open minds to listen to the public testimony.
12 I ask that you bless every single individual
13 who comes to share and give us input into this
14 process. Bless them for taking the time out to
15 engage in this civic discourse. Thank you for
16 your many blessings, and I just ask all these
17 things in your name. Amen.

18 MR. BERUFF: Now if we can all stand for
19 the Pledge of Allegiance. Thank you.

24 MR. BERUFF: I'd like to take a moment and
25 introduce, starting to my right, the

2 me. First is Commissioner Karlinsky,
3 Commissioner Heuchan, Commissioner Gamez,
4 Commissioner Nocco, to my right. To my left,
5 everybody knows our famous Commissioner Bondi,
6 Commissioner Smith, Commissioner Cerio,
7 Commissioner Coxe, Commissioner Gainey. And
8 then behind me from right to left we have
9 Commissioner Armas, Commissioner Martinez,
10 Commissioner Gaetz, Commissioner Schifino,
11 Commissioner Kruppenbacher, Commissioner
12 Newsome, Commissioner Nunez, Commissioner
13 Stewart, Commissioner Solari, Commissioner
14 Thurlow-Lippisch, Commissioner Timmann,
15 Commissioner Carlton, Commissioner Donalds
16 twice because I missed her last week,
17 Commissioner Joyner, Commissioner Stemberger,
18 and Commissioner Levesque. Thank you all for
19 being here today. I know it's a lot of
20 traveling. The Miami traffic is infamous, so.

21 With that, we're going to bring our first
22 speaker forward and that is Ashley Kerduge
23 (phonetic). Please come -- when you come to
24 the -- to the microphone, if you'll announce
25 your name so we can get it down correct, that

1 would be great. And you have two minutes.

2 MS. VERDUGO: Mr. Chairman, members of the
3 commission, I am Ashley Verdugo, social media
4 director of Christian Family Coalition in
5 Florida. My organization represents half a
6 million fair minded, pro-life, pro-family
7 voters. The original intent of Article 1,
8 Section 23 of the Privacy Clause of the Florida
9 Constitution which I'm sure you're aware of
10 approved by the Florida voters was to protect
11 themselves from the government's ability to
12 gather personal information through technology.
13 In 1989 the Privacy Clause was used as an
14 excuse to create a fundamental right to
15 abortion for minors. The Florida Supreme Court
16 engaged in judicial acronymism [SIC] by ignoring
17 the original intent and the will of the people.
18 Now all of you as members of the Constitutional
19 Revision Commission have the opportunity to
20 remedy this great injustice. Article 1,
21 Section 21 of the Florida Constitution clearly
22 states, all political power is inherent with
23 the people. Article 1, Section 21 of the
24 Florida State Constitution clearly states, all
25 political power is inherent with the people.

1 This was not the case in 1989 when the clause
2 was misused and created a faith right to
3 abortion and has not been the case since. It
4 is time to return the political inherent power
5 back to the people. Thank you.

6 MR. BERUFF: Thank you. Mayor Greg Ross
7 and -- I don't want to mispronounce this,
8 P-I-Y-U-S-H, Agrawal will be after that, thank
9 you, and after that Susan Windmiller. Go
10 ahead.

11 MR. ROSS: Good evening. I'm Greg Ross,
12 Mayor of Cooper City, located in Broward County
13 and president of Broward League of Cities. It
14 is my pleasure to be here tonight representing
15 the 31 cities in Broward County, as well as the
16 412 cities of the Florida League of Cities. I
17 would like to thank each and every one of you
18 for your service as a member of the State
19 Constitution Revision Commission. Your
20 commitment to serve our state as a commissioner
21 is truly admirable and very much appreciated.
22 It is great to see Commissioner Smith whom I've
23 had the opportunity with -- excuse me -- the
24 opportunity to work with over the years. I do
25 stand before with one goal that Florida's

1 municipalities want you to know is our priority
2 as it relates to the Florida Constitution, that
3 is to protect and preserve our home rule
4 authority. We believe that local control and
5 the concept that government closest to the
6 people governs best. Since 1968 home rule
7 powers have been a part of our state
8 Constitution. Local elected officials are
9 unique in that the services and operations we
10 govern are the foremost concerns of our
11 residents. Public safety, parks, recreation,
12 solid waste, zoning, et cetera are all
13 components of our resident's daily lives and we
14 are proud to deliver quality products and
15 services that meet the unique needs of each of
16 our cities. Florida cities offer many choices
17 to citizens and this is one of the reasons why
18 people move to our great state. From the
19 southern end of our state, Key West, to the
20 northern city of Destin, our cities offer
21 varying lifestyles. This is not by accident.
22 It occurs because local government that best
23 represents a community's values, culture, and
24 vision. Local government meetings are held
25 several times a month our residents to often

1 engage. They have the opportunity to voice
2 their opinions and thoughts in our decision
3 making process without having to leave their
4 hometown. We truly are partners in creating
5 cities that residents are proud to call home.
6 On behalf of the Broward and Florida League of
7 Cities who stand ready to assist you in any way
8 possible. We have many successful --

9 MR. BERUFF: -- you need to wrap up.

10 MR. ROSS: 30 seconds -- of how local
11 control would have been used to solve local
12 issues. We also have data and statistics that
13 could be helpful to you. And in closing, we
14 ask that you remember that home rule authority
15 has been a part of our Constitution for almost
16 50 years. We've been elected by our residents
17 to make sure their cities thrive and prosper
18 and home rule authority allows us to do that,
19 so please, protect, preserve this very
20 important public policy. Thank you.

21 MR. BERUFF: Thank you. You may --

22 MR. AGRAWAL: Mr. Chairman, Honorable
23 Commissioners, my name is Piyush Agrawal and I
24 am going to talk about -- Article 1, Section 2.
25 I am a proud citizen of USA, the country which

1 is the torch bearer of upholding the human
2 rights. The Section 2 in the basic rights in
3 Florida's Constitution does not conform to
4 U.S. standards. I wanted to bring this
5 contradiction. In practice no harm has been
6 done yet in the State of Florida despite the
7 existence of the phrase, and I quote, except
8 that the ownership, inheritance, disposition
9 and possession of real property by aliens
10 ineligible for citizenship may be regulated and
11 prohibited by law. The definition of
12 citizenship has been changing -- the phrase in
13 question may have had some relevance in the
14 distant past, but in today's times it has no --

15 MR. BERUFF: Excuse me. If you get a
16 little bit closer to that microphone.

17 MR. AGRAWAL: Okay, sir. Thank you very
18 much. The phrase in question may have had some
19 relevance in the distant past, but in today's
20 time it has no place in the Constitution of a
21 progressive state like Florida. As a point of
22 information, Florida is the only state in the
23 union that still has this discriminatory
24 language in the Constitution. In the past
25 several attempts have been made to bring this

1 issue of the attention in the legislature.
2 Bills have been proposed, but nothing has
3 happened. There's a reason the commission
4 exists. We are grateful to CRC to call it a
5 listening tour. And, sir, ladies and
6 gentleman, all the commissioners, if you are
7 listening, I want one simple request, to kindly
8 delete this phrase which is -- which presents
9 racism and discrimination practice, Section 2
10 of Article 1.

11 MR. BERUFF: Would you please turn that in
12 also for our records?

13 MR. AGRAWAL: Yes, sir.

14 MR. BERUFF: Thank you very much. Yes,
15 ma'am.

16 MS. WINDMILLER: Good afternoon, Chairman
17 Beruff and commissioners. My name is Susan
18 Windmiller and I'm president of the League of
19 Women Voters of Miami-Dade County. Changing
20 our state's guiding documents to our
21 Constitution is serious and important. The
22 work of your commission is powerful. As you
23 have already said, this is the third time that
24 the CRC has been convened in Florida. The CRC
25 must conduct its business in the sunshine with

1 open meetings and open records. After all,
2 we're the sunshine state, where we do business
3 in the sunshine. It is absolutely vital that
4 the CRC now act with complete commitment to
5 transparency, that all activities and records
6 be open, and that you act with full knowledge
7 of your responsibility to ensure maximum public
8 participation. That means that meetings and
9 hearings and opportunities for public input
10 must be scheduled with ample time to ensure the
11 most public participation. Once your proposals
12 are crafted, they must be made available to the
13 public with time again for the opportunities to
14 review and comment before any votes are cast on
15 ballots. Mr. Chairman and commissioners, we
16 are watching, the League of Women Voters and
17 all our partners across the great State of
18 Florida and all of our citizens. We are
19 encouraging all Florida voters to be involved
20 and regularly visit your website, flcrc.gov,
21 for announcements of meetings, proposals, and
22 commission activities. Ultimately government
23 of, by, and for the people works when the
24 leaders open their doors to the public.

3 While you're coming up to the podium, I
4 don't want to take your time in your two
5 minutes, so we appreciate your thanks for us
6 participating in this process, but it's the job
7 we signed for, so if you want to get directly
8 to your subject, it's better for you and for
9 us. Thank you.

10 MR. LANDERA: My name Mario Landera and
11 I'm a volunteer with the American Cancer
12 Society Cancer Action Network, or ACSCAN.
13 ACSCAN is a non-profit, non-partisan advocacy
14 affiliate of the American Cancer Society
15 supporting evidence based policy and
16 legislative solutions designed to eliminate
17 cancer as a major health problem. I'm here
18 today to speak in support of two tobacco
19 control related amendments. Article 10,
20 Section 20 of the Florida Constitution was
21 passed in 2002 by more than 70 percent of
22 Florida voters. The amendment prohibits
23 smoking in most indoor work places including
24 restaurants. Prior to the implementation of
25 this amendment, each stating nearly 800,000

1 private sector employees, nearly 2 million
2 diners, and about 1 million restaurant
3 employees were exposed to second hand smoke.
4 Making most indoor work places in the state
5 free from tobacco smoke has improved public
6 health for workers and patrons. Article 10,
7 Section 27 was passed in 2006 by more than 60
8 percent of Florida voters. The amendment
9 mandates that the state allocate a portion of
10 tobacco settlement money for tobacco
11 prevention. Most of you are probably familiar
12 with the resulting program called Tobacco Free
13 Florida. In 2006 the adult smoking rate was
14 21. In 2016 it was down to 15.8 percent, the
15 lowest it has ever been. Since Tobacco Free
16 Florida was created, the youth smoking rate has
17 decreased from 10.6 percent in 2006 to 3
18 percent in 2015; that's an astounding 71
19 percent decrease. While the program has made
20 remarkable progress, smoking remains a leading
21 cause of preventable disease and death and
22 7,400 Floridians continue to become smokers
23 each year. ASCCAN stands ready to provide
24 additional information as needed. Thank you.

1 MS. WHEELER: Yes, Cynthia Wheeler. I'm
2 here to ask that you abandon or modify Article
3 5, Section 12 of the Florida Constitution
4 related to confidentiality of complaints and
5 judicial misconduct. Bad judges are past
6 around like pedophile -- they start in criminal
7 court and if they show out there, they transfer
8 them to family court where there are no
9 recorders, then they transfer them to juvenile
10 court. Five years, 2,000 cases, 2.2 million
11 dollars and kick backs -- two judges sentenced
12 to prison for 28 years for selling kids to a
13 juvenile correction facility. There are red
14 flags, but those red flags were held behind the
15 confidentiality extended to complaints of
16 judicial misconduct. And to this day those
17 judges are in prison, but we don't know why
18 Pennsylvania Board of Judicial Misconduct
19 didn't address those issues. If those issues
20 were before the public, we would have put --
21 connected the dots sooner. Florida has the
22 same confidentiality in its Constitution and we
23 need to have more transparency. We can protect
24 judges by providing a confidential -- to each
25 judge for which the -- is the keeper of the

1 record and publish that the judge has 1
2 complaint or 100 complaints. We don't know.
3 We have to trust that the JQC is doing their
4 job, and the JQC has surreptitiously modified
5 Florida's Constitution. The JQC Investigative
6 Panel is the only panel with the authority to
7 determine -- it is composed of 4 judges, 2
8 attorneys, and 3 citizens. They have changed
9 it to screening staff from 2012 JQC report to
10 the 2014. They didn't do one in 2013. I have
11 that in here for you all to screening staff.
12 And when you put on your critical thinking
13 skills and deductive reason, it's the 2
14 secretaries. Now, that panel is 4 judges and 2
15 attorneys because the greater -- knowledge is
16 required. For judges they have -- an attorney
17 may only possess knowledge of one or two areas
18 in which they practice. Now, the JQC hands
19 aren't clean. This is hidden away in reports
20 that we do not read and we need to have it. I
21 have developed a method and a sample of how we
22 can preserve judges without defaming them, but
23 also allowing the public to see if a judge has
24 300 complaints or 30 complaints. There's only
25 been 850 cases is the most complaints the JQC

1 has ever received. There's a million motions
2 filed in the state, and that's less than 1
3 percent of people that actually complain, and
4 we need that transparency. I have all the
5 statistical data here for you.

6 MR. BERUFF: Okay. If you'd leave that
7 with us, that'd be great. And your name is on
8 it. Thank you, Cynthia. Ms. Fernandez.

9 MS. FERNANDEZ: Good evening. Maggie
10 Fernandez, super voter. Mr. Chairman and
11 members of the commission, so in 2008 I was
12 actually staffed to Miami-Dade County's Charter
13 Review Task Force, so I understand the amount
14 of pressure and the huge responsibility that
15 you all have to the people of Florida through
16 this process. And I want to reiterate that --
17 you are accountable to the people of Florida.
18 So I'm just going to throw it all out there,
19 let this serve as a heads up, the people of
20 Florida will not stand for voter
21 disenfranchisement, changes to their districts,
22 school vouchers -- for the judiciary, the
23 weakening of home rule, attack on my
24 reproductive rights. So any proposed questions
25 or amendments that support any of the things I

1 just spoke about are an attack on our
2 democracy. So -- wrong page. Okay, here we
3 go. Sorry. So -- I thank you -- okay, so the
4 people of Florida will not stand for that. You
5 will be investing a huge amount of time on the
6 commission and I thank you for that, but I want
7 you all to be successful. Right? They were
8 successful at the last one. So I encourage you
9 to propose amendments that protect fair
10 districts, that expand voter rights, that
11 protect the environment and increase renewable
12 energy, that protects public schools, that
13 protects home rule, that protect -- judiciary,
14 and protect my reproductive rights. So
15 anything that endangers those things endangers
16 democracy. And I promise that we will fight
17 really hard if there's any questions that go
18 against the things that I am speaking about, so
19 thank you.

21 Amon, I think I -- John Amon, Karen
22 G-H-S-H-T-A --

23 MS. GUSHTA: Gushta.

24 MR. BERUFF: -- Gushta, thank you, and
25 Kathy Pelton.

1 MR. AMON: Thank you. I'm John Amon,
2 president of Broward Right to Life which
3 advocates for the interest of the unborn child
4 and his or her parents, all of whom are
5 victimized by abortion in our state, which by
6 the way is the leading cause of death in
7 Florida. I'm here because Florida's privacy
8 amendment, Article 1, Section 23 has been
9 misapplied to Abortion, the topic -- the CRC
10 and the people of Florida never intended when
11 it was approved in 1980. The CRC needs
12 therefore I think to restore it to its proper
13 historical meaning and there's no ambiguity
14 about what that is. Approved by the people in
15 1980, this provision first became applicable
16 wrongly to Abortion in 1989 with Florida's
17 liberal activist supreme court commandeered the
18 amendment establishing a precedent followed
19 ever since in the courts to limit the public's
20 right -- excuse me -- in direct violation of
21 the purpose for which this amendment was
22 drafted and in direct violation of the will of
23 Florida voters. Now, how do we know this?
24 Well, let me quote the Florida Supreme Court on
25 this subject, in 1987 the state high court

1 ruled in -- South Florida blood that, quote,
2 there can be no doubt that the Florida
3 amendment was intended to protect the right to
4 determine whether or not sensitive information
5 about -- will be disclosed to others. And the
6 court went on to say that the proceedings of
7 the Constitution Revision Commission repeal
8 with the right to informational privacy was a
9 major concern of the amendments drafters, not
10 Abortion. However, the state high court
11 without a basis in law commandeered and
12 hijacked this provision and used it to place
13 Abortion beyond the will of voters. That is
14 why I urge the CRC to revise the language of
15 Article 1, Section 23 to ensure it reflects the
16 will of the voters as passed originally. Thank
17 you.

19 MS. GUSHTA: I'm Karen Gushta from
20 Margate, Florida and I'm speaking here as a
21 private citizen. I'm here to ask the CRC to
22 restore privacy amendment to its original
23 purpose. The clear intent of the Florida
24 legislature and the citizens of Florida who
25 adopted Article 1, Section 23, the so-called

1 privacy amendment, was to provide protection
2 from government's intrusive power to gather
3 personal information and data. As Chief
4 Justice Ben Overton stated in 1977 at the
5 opening session of the CRC, there is public
6 concern about how personal information
7 concerning an individual citizen is used,
8 whether it is be collected by government or by
9 business. And Representative John Mills, the
10 legislative sponsor of the privacy amendment --
11 solution stated, the goal is to provide
12 individual and informational privacy, the
13 bigger government gets, the more it tends to
14 collect information on people. Yet today these
15 concerns are even greater than 1977. We see
16 examples of privacy issues like surveillance,
17 drones, computer hacking, smart phones being
18 monitored, et cetera. However, the Florida
19 Supreme Court betrayed the people of Florida in
20 1989 by subsequently interpreting this article
21 to create a fundamental right for a minor to
22 kill her baby. In doing so the court violated
23 and disrespected an act of direct democracy by
24 the people of Florida. Therefore, I'm
25 requesting the CRC to fix the privacy amendment

1 and restore it to its original purpose and to
2 protect the informational privacy of the
3 citizens of Florida. Thank you.

4 MR. BERUFF: Thank you.

5 MS. PELTON: Good evening, or good
6 afternoon I should, CRC. Committee members, my
7 name is Kathy Pelton and I am the Florida
8 director for Grey2K USA. We are a organization
9 dedicated to protecting the racing greyhounds.
10 Article 7, Section 7 of the Florida
11 Constitution talks about the distribution of
12 taxes collected from para-mutual facilities
13 which may be given to various counties in
14 Florida. The problem is Florida now spends
15 more money regulating live greyhound racing
16 that -- than they collect in taxes and fees.
17 This just doesn't make sense. To be more
18 specific over the last 26 years taxes and fees
19 collected by the State of Florida for live
20 greyhound racing have gone from \$76 million in
21 1990 to \$1.4 million in 2016. That is a
22 reduction of 98 percent. Currently we have 40
23 states that have banned greyhound racing.
24 Arizona just did it last year. Obviously with
25 over 8,000 racing dogs and 12 operating tracks

1 in Florida, we haven't done it yet. I have
2 been actively working to end greyhound racing
3 in Florida for 15 years. I know that the vast
4 majority of Florida residents understand the
5 inherent cruelty of this industry. And I am
6 also aware that almost every major Florida
7 newspaper has written scathing editorials about
8 this industry. You are now in the position to
9 put greyhound racing before the Florida voters
10 and let them decide once and for all if they
11 want this cruel, money losing industry in their
12 state.

23 I'm here to address a specific example in
24 Article 1, Section 23, commonly known as the

2 all of the discussion at that time and all the
3 debate regarding this section focused on
4 informational privacy; that wasn't the purpose.
5 The need to protect the public from privacy
6 intrusion has obviously increased. All you
7 have to do is watch the news to see what's
8 going on out there. And we do need to review
9 this to be a lot more specific. We need to
10 build in language that expands the protection
11 from what we understood back in 1978 about
12 protecting privacy through what we understand
13 now. We're here to request that review of that
14 section. At the same time we're requesting a
15 typing of the language because as it's been
16 pointed out a couple of times, the language is
17 so broad that basically it can be applied to
18 almost anything. In 1989 the section was
19 actually used to support the right of a minor
20 to abort the -- to abort her child over
21 parental objections. The language is so broad
22 that it allows even that interpretation of
23 meaning, from informational privacy to Abortion
24 privacy. Well, the door's been left open and
25 we don't know where else this particular

2 opportunity to go back and review it, tighten
3 it up, be specific about what it means to make
4 sure that we don't create any more new rights
5 inadvertently. We want to close that door.
6 Thank you.

7 MR. BERUFF: Thank you, Mr. Walker. Yes,
8 ma'am.

9 MS. DANIELS: Yes. I'm Bonnie Daniels and
10 I'm here today to ask you to right a 150 year
11 old wrong. I'm referring to Article 6, Section
12 4 of the Florida Constitution which takes away
13 the right to vote for life from anyone ever
14 convicted of a felony -- was born of racial
15 bigotry. It was written into our state
16 Constitution in 1868, just after the Civil War,
17 with the expressed purpose of disenfranchising
18 newly freed black slaves who at that time
19 compromised nearly 49 percent of our state's
20 population. White Floridians feared that the
21 black population would outnumber and outvote
22 them. Many states had similar provisions in
23 their Constitutions and laws, but today
24 Florida's stands out as one of only 3 states
25 that still claims to this shameful and

1 counterproductive regime which is responsible
2 for currently disenfranchising an estimated 1.7
3 million Floridians, a disproportionate number
4 of whom are black. The racist genesis of this
5 provision and its persistently discriminatory
6 affect are reason alone to abandon it, but
7 there are also compelling basic feminist and
8 social policy reasons for doing so. First, the
9 provision violates the implicit social compact
10 in our criminal justice system that regards a
11 person who has committed a crime and served his
12 or her sentence as having paid their debt to
13 society. This provision imposes a harsh,
14 additional, and extra judicial lifetime
15 punishment beyond what the criminal law has
16 seemed fit to impose. Second, this provision
17 is unjust and immoral. It violates the nearly
18 universal belief that everyone deserves a
19 second chance. Finally, this provision is
20 totally -- productive to forever stigmatize
21 people who have committed felonies by branding
22 them as unfit to vote, inhibits their
23 rehabilitation and reintegration into society.
24 Indeed studies have shown that citizen rights
25 decline significantly among those who are

2 amended multiple times since 1868, but
3 incredibly no prior revision commission has
4 acted to abandon this provision. I hope that
5 this commission will have the integrity,

7 necessary to undo this law and take Florida
8 into the 21st century. Thank you.

9 MR. BERUFF: Thank you.

10 MR. ANDOLLO: Thank you. When my mother
11 was pregnant with me her doctors told her that
12 I would be born different, that I would have
13 abnormalities, I would be disabled, and that I
14 would have a troubled life. And even though my
15 mother never thought about it, a lot of young
16 women who are in troubled pregnancies are
17 confronted with that and they're encouraged to
18 abort their. I don't think that anybody should
19 be aborted just because they don't fit our
20 definition of what is normal. Abortion affects
21 mostly minorities. There are some communities
22 where sex elected abortion is performed because
23 they prefer men to women. And inevitably
24 it's -- the vast majority of abortions happen
25 into poor families. I don't think that your

4 please consider putting a life beginning at
5 conception amendment to the Florida

8 democracy represents them too. Thank you.

9 Another thing that is important that is
10 important to me is I did come from a low income
11 household, and I was very grateful to my
12 church, and my family, and my community that I
13 was able to attend great catholic schools. Not
14 everybody has that opportunity and because of
15 where they happen to live, they may end up
16 getting a bad education. I think that Florida
17 should imitate the law that is currently in
18 place in Nevada where the education dollars are
19 allocated per student and the parents are
20 allowed to spend it however they choose in
21 order to get their children the best education
22 possible. This is especially important for
23 people with disabled children to be able to
24 find the right providers that they need for
25 their children.

11 meetings and facilitate commission business in

22 restitution, parole, and probation opportunity

8 And there are 1,500,000 people waiting, more
9 than 1,500,000 people who need this service.
10 They're not allowed -- they're not allowed to

14 but in order to get the opportunity to vote, an
15 application is made for clemency, but it's made
16 to be carried out governor and the parole
17 board. If the -- and the governor decides how
18 it's going to get done. So if the governor
19 wants a process that is there, he can set one
20 up. Under Charlie Christ 166,000 ex-felons
21 received their voting rights back.

15 shakes. We have veterans with PTSD who feel

9 Constitution which declares it to be a
10 paramount duty of the state to make adequate
11 revisions for the education of all children
12 residing within its borders. I will make two
13 recommendations. One, change the first
14 sentence of this section to declare the
15 education of children not a fundamental value,
16 but rather a fundamental right of the people of
17 Florida. And two, retain the word uniform in
18 the third sentence. Uniform does not mean that
19 every fifth grader is reading from a set page
20 in the same text book at 11:00 a.m. on a given
21 day. It does mean that in our state we do not
22 create insulated silos of learning where some
23 children are receiving adequate instruction and

2 addressing that? The failure of the state to
3 enforce existing laws permitted in power

8 themselves, 3,000 feet into the boulder zone on
9 the assumption that that toxic chemical waste
10 and radiological waste which includes and
11 strontium 90, cesium and tritium will be

9 a generation of Floridians find a mysterious
10 box left on their doorstep with the name

23 organization, and determination to pass
24 potentially far reaching laws that might not

2 Although previous commissions have come and

9 past 20 years we've seen amendments past and
10 repealed, as well as questions on the same
11 matter placed on the ballot repeatedly. At a

15 constitutional revision commission process be
16 abolished. Let our politics become more
17 ordinary, hedged in by many rules, procedures,
18 customs, checks and balances. Let's not be

21 go back to your homes and your work. Each of
22 you a Washington to Mount Vernon, each of you a

2 here. I've submitted four amendments on four
3 proposed topics to the CRC. I'm going to speak
4 briefly on each of them.

5 First is on home rule. Obviously there
6 needs to be something done about home rule.
7 There seems to be a discord between the state
8 and local governments. There needs to be a
9 balance. As a local government attorney, I
10 think my focus is there always needs to be a
11 government that can address a problem. That's
12 what the police power is. Sometimes it's the
13 state on a uniform basis, sometimes it's a city
14 on a very specific basis. And I think it's
15 important that we preserve those principles of
16 home rule because ultimately I think it helps
17 the people.

18 The second topic is sovereign immunity. I
19 proposed a specific rule on sovereign unity
20 that will recognize it in the Constitution and
21 recognize it as an immunity from suit. This
22 will help local governments and the state
23 government be able to raise motions based on
24 sovereign immunity in state court and in
25 federal court and have those appealed

1 immediately if sovereign immunity is denied.

2 The third topic is on the court system and
3 its per curiam affirmances. I -- about 75
4 percent of the decisions in Florida of the
5 appellate courts, the district courts of

7 decision with one word, affirmed. My view, and
8 I was the chair of the commission ad hoc
9 committee on per curiam affirmances for the
10 Appellate Court Rules Committee, and I've also
11 written a law review article on this topic that
12 will be in the FIU Law Review which I'll send
13 each of you, but I think that that's a real
14 problem. I think that court's should write
15 opinions. I think people expect that when they
16 go to the court system. And I also think
17 ultimately it helps ensure that when a decision
18 is made, that judicial restraint is followed,
19 that a reason is given for the decision, and
20 that it's high to the law that is written. I
21 think that that's very important. And I think
22 it also sets precedent for the future.

23 Finally, and this is one close to my
24 heart, my daughter has very severe autism. I
25 saw when I was looking at Article 1, Section 2

22 thank you. I'm a retired school teacher.

2 to talk about something that's near and dear to
3 my heart and that's the FCAT and standardized
4 testing. I want to ask you how does it serve
5 us? It really doesn't serve us. You know,
6 except the testing companies make a lot of
7 money. It instills fear in our children. I've
8 seen children pee their pants waiting for the
9 test. I routinely, routinely see children
10 who've thrown up before the test. It also
11 helps to erode local control of the schools
12 because we're dictating what we have to teach
13 and how to teach it. It creates a narrow --
14 narrow goals for our schools and it pretty much
15 diverts a lot of resources away from the
16 schools. My point is this, we were able to put
17 a man on the moon without standardized testing.
18 We were able to put -- create the semiconductor
19 with public school educated students without
20 standardized testing. We were able to -- we
21 were able to win World War II without
22 standardized testing. We were able to build
23 the transcontinental railroad without
24 standardized testing. We were able to do many,
25 many things without standardized testing. We

1 compare ourselves to the Chinese, the Swedes,
2 the Germans and we always come in 15th or 16th.
3 I want to tell you that this is the greatest
4 country in the world and we do not standardized
5 testing. Thank you.

8 MR. KAHGAN: Good afternoon. My name is
9 Carin Kahgan. I'm speaking on behalf of
10 myself. I have a two pronged comment, one
11 procedural and one substantive.

12 To follow-up on the comments of Ms.
13 Windmiller and Ms. Sawyer regarding the
14 commission's purpose of public access, I would
15 ask if -- I noticed that today your proceedings
16 are live streamed video on the Florida channel.
17 If you can assure all Floridians that all your
18 meetings and hearings will be live streamed so
19 that all the people of the State of Florida can
20 be aware of what you're doing and have
21 sufficient time to be able to respond to both
22 your discussions and what your inclinations
23 appear to be regarding various proposals.

24 My other comment is more substantive. And

4 introduced by a Florida State Senator Torres,

6 to follow-up on the comments of another speaker
7 who advocates retention of the right of the
8 people of the State of Florida to propose a
9 ballot to proposed amendments of the
10 Constitution. His proposal would provide a
11 petition vehicle for members of their Florida
12 elected to propose legislation to be considered
13 provided insufficient by language by the
14 Florida Supreme Court. It allows the people of
15 the State of Florida to speak their mind and
16 seek legislation, even if their elected
17 legislatures don't see fit to do so. I thank
18 you.

20 MR. HEARNE: Hi. My name is Jeff Hearne.
21 I'm the board member of the ACLU Miami Chapter
22 here locally. I'm going to talk about two --
23 two positions that we would like the commission
24 to support.

1 commission do nothing to change the no-aid
2 provision in the Constitution. As you can --

3 MR. NEWSOME: -- you said the no what?

4 MR. HEARNE: The no-aid provision which
5 prohibits funding of religious organizations.
6 This has been in the Florida Constitution since
7 1885 and has worked well. It puts all
8 religions on equal footing. It applies to a
9 religious organization whether it's Christian,
10 Muslim, Jewish, or some other faith, so it
11 protects the religious liberties of all
12 Floridians. It protects Floridians from being
13 compelled to support religion that they do not
14 support, and that really supports the concept
15 of religious freedom. And most importantly in
16 2012 an amendment was placed on the ballot to
17 make a change to the no-aid provision and it
18 did not pass. For that reason it would -- it
19 would seem inappropriate to a few years later
20 to put this back on the ballot, so we request
21 that you make no changes to that provision.

22 The second point I want to make is one
23 that you've heard from already today. We're
24 asking that you support the amendment to allow
25 for the automatic rights restoration of felons

2 the most punitive states in the country, and
3 that's not a list that we want to be on. We're
4 one of the four states that do not provide --
5 who have permanent voting rights prohibition

8 reasons to make a change, but most important
9 it's the right thing to do. Thank you.

10 MR. BERUFF: Thank you. After this
11 speaker we're going to take a five minute break
12 so our stenographer can -- will rest her hands.
13 Thank you so much.

14 MS. LUCAS: I'm sure ya'll are glad about
15 having that break. I'm Teresa Lucas and I'm a
16 faculty member here at the School of Education
17 and Human Development at FIU, and I'd like to
18 suggest that we don't make suggestions towards
19 changing Article 1, Section 3, as the speaker
20 before me mentioned, and as I was also going to
21 mention Article 9, Section 1 which guarantees a
22 uniform public education for all students.
23 School choice is interesting, but it will never
24 reach all of our students. We need uniform
25 public education for all students. No -- no

2 privatized their education. The schools are

9 perfect marmalade, right? Well, we don't have
10 the choice of throwing out the bad
11 strawberries. We have to educate all of our

17 9 and Article 1 and keep our schools and
18 better -- so that we can better public

16 supervisor -- in Heartbeat of Miami which

21 especially in case of minors. You don't want
22 your daughter or your granddaughter to get an
23 Abortion without parent consent. Parents have

2 it was informational privacy for the person.
3 Since 1989 our state shut down a parental
4 consent law that has been upheld at the federal
5 level. Our state court also recently and

7 though this kind of law has been upheld in the
8 federal court. I meet women every day who are
9 scared and unsure when they find out they are
10 pregnant, and they need time to learn and
11 reflect about the options available to them.
12 I experienced -- I'm experienced with trauma
13 Abortion and I wish they would have had more
14 education or more time to consider this right
15 decision. I ask you to consider an amendment
16 that will clarify that the privacy clause in
17 Florida's Constitution does not intend to grant
18 any greater rights to Abortion than the U.S.A.
19 Constitution. Thank you very much.

21 MS. RIVERA: Good afternoon. My name is
22 Pastor Marylin Rivera and I am with the
23 Hispanic Minister's Association. We represent
24 over 200 pastors. We believe that the privacy
25 clause, Article 1, Section 23 needs to be fixed

7 I'm a proud Floridian. I'm a dad. I'm a
8 husband. Professionally I'm a pastor of a
9 local congregation and I'm here representing
10 Mission Miami and Hispanic Action Network.
11 Together we represent over 300 churches in
12 South Florida. We're here to ask you to look
13 at the privacy clause. It needs to be changed
14 and fixed to go back to its original intent
15 which was informational privacy. Ladies and
16 gentlemen, Floridians spoke clearly through our
17 elected officials. We want parental
18 notification when our minor young -- when our
19 minor girls go get an Abortion. We spoke
20 clearly through elected officials, and
21 unfortunately it was -- this was hijacked by
22 judicial activists and this has become now like
23 the abortion clause for minors. It's sad that
24 something that was designed to protect me and
25 protect my privacy has now turned around and

8 that this process is fair and transparent, and
9 that no members of this commission hold private
10 meetings between two members that they do not
11 disclose any conversations that have to do with
12 the official business of this commission. And

16 MR. THORSON: Hello, I'm Larry Thorson.
17 I'm a retired journalist. Been living in
18 Miami, Miami Beach since about 1996. And I'm a
19 super voter like a previous person who spoke,
20 and democracy is something you are -- you're
21 going to have a bigger role than you ever had
22 before, I think, if you're going to change the
23 Constitution. My judgment on the situation in
24 the United States these days is we have a big
25 problem, a really big problem, and it hasn't

2 for the -- of democracy is money out of

8 Florida with the Constitution, and this is the
9 way we can start the national movement or
10 actually participate in the national movement
11 of other states and cities that are urging

15 the filth in the Everglades when a big
16 farmer -- big -- can do whatever it wants? How

15 your first meeting held on March 20 weeks in
16 advance, but you did not announce that meeting
17 until just two business days before. We hope
18 that going forward you will give the public and
19 your members ample notice so you can have the

21 every 20 years process. At your March 20
22 meeting the chair without any previous notice
23 to the public and apparently even without
24 notice to commission members announced that
25 public hearings would begin the next week.

9 legislative session putting the legislators who
10 are on the commission, 5 of the 37 members, in
11 the difficult position of having to miss
12 legislative sessions or CRC meetings. The
13 timing also makes it almost impossible for
14 others engaged in the legislative session to
15 attend to the public meetings. The harder it
16 is for people to participate, the less
17 participation there will be. Moving forward,
18 we urge you to schedule meetings and public
19 hearings at times that are fully vetted and
20 avoid built-in conflicts. We hope you're not
21 trying to limit the participation of members by
22 scheduling meetings at times that conflict with
23 other public obligations. And lastly I want to
24 say that really guys, FIU on a Monday 6:00 p.m.

10 MS. TANG: Hi, good afternoon. My name is
11 Winnie Tang and I'm serve as -- for Asian
12 American Federation of Florida and I would ask
13 you to consider to remove the Article 1,
14 Section 2 of the -- as for the alien be
15 eligible for citizenship. And this is one
16 really started in about 1913 from California
17 first -- this one. After that it traveled all
18 the way to the east. In 1926 Florida adapted
19 it as the Constitution in our state. And that
20 one is -- what we call is a so-called alien
21 land law which is really prohibit Asian -- on
22 the naturalization Article 1, 1795 to -- white
23 people become citizens and the Naturalization
24 Act of 1816 for the African American -- African
25 to become citizens. So Asian, we are neither

16 repeal the alien land law on behalf of the

21 the -- after 2008, the elections, the Florida
22 state is only state to have this language in
23 our Constitution. So we are the only one
24 state -- look for leadership and then to repeal
25 this law to really have to remove this one

5 MR. MOORE: Good evening, commissioners.
6 My name is Timothy Moore. Florida suffers from
7 partisan gerrymandering, largely unaccountable
8 legislature, and increasing polarization. The
9 cure, an independent re-districting commission.
10 Florida's democracy of competition within
11 districts, competitiveness of races, and seats
12 and votes that are proportional, yet startling
13 results in the 2016 election show this is not
14 the case in Florida. The state helps races.
15 52 percent of races have one major party that
16 over a majority. Out of the remaining races
17 where there are 2 major parties, only 6 of 57
18 were competitive. The democrats received 34
19 percent of seats, yet received 40 percent of
20 the vote. The republicans however received 66
21 percent of the seats with only 60 percent of
22 the vote. The state senate 55 percent of the
23 races had only one party. Again, a majority of
24 these races with only one party. The U.S.
25 house races, again, a disparity amongst

1 proportion of votes. Democrats received 40
2 percent of the seats, yet received 46 percent
3 of the vote. Republicans received 60 percent
4 of the seats, yet received only 53 percent of
5 the vote. And of the 27 races, only two were
6 competitive. This is not a democrat and this
7 is not a republican problem. This is a problem
8 for all Floridians because polarization pushes
9 the minority as well as the moderates out of
10 the way and has the legislature in the hands of
11 only those that are in the radical portion of
12 the majority. An independent re-districting
13 commission is the answer because as the League
14 of Women Voters litigation has demonstrated,
15 the legislature is either unwilling or unable
16 to meet its constitutional duty and draw fair
17 districts for Floridian voters. In my closing
18 seconds I'd like to cover some of the important
19 features of this independent re-districting
20 commission which I will submit to you in the
21 coming weeks. Commissioner Joyner will
22 probably many of these features as they were in
23 her bill from the legislature. Voters from
24 previous two elections will not be government,
25 employees of government officials, be

15 immigrants land were taken by force -- are
16 located in Boca Raton Airport and in Florida
17 Atlantic University. Florida is the only state
18 still have a Constitution with this -- racial
19 and discrimination language in that book. On
20 behalf of Asian -- on behalf of Asian community
21 in Florida, we would like to regress Florida
22 Constitution Revision Commission to consider to
23 remove the racial discrimination -- of alien
24 land law from our Constitution, Article 1,
25 Section 2, basic rights. Thank you. God bless

4 MS. MIGLIO: Good evening. This is
5 Teresita Miglio. Mr. Chairman and members of
6 the commission, I'm a spokesperson for the
7 Christian Family Coalition of Florida. We
8 represent half a million members and we are
9 pro-life and pro-family voters. I am here to
10 talk about Article 1, Section 23, an area that
11 seems to need -- needs to look at so that we
12 can correct something that has been done that
13 is against what it -- the original intent was.
14 And I don't want to repeat myself, I just want
15 to -- because I know a lot of people have
16 talked about it, but I just want to bring a few
17 things. And I have left this out with you so
18 you can read the -- the tool of what I'm
19 bringing. It is clear that the original intent
20 of the privacy clause was to protect its
21 citizens and residents of this country from
22 intrusion of the government into their
23 informational privacy. The right to privacy is
24 clearly about documentation, information, and
25 privacy. More clearly stated, the right not to

2 more urgent and others have talked about
3 because of the increase in technology how this

8 to open the door to allow minors without the
9 consent of their parents to have abortions.
10 This clearly undermines our democracy. The
11 deliberate intention of a few to subvert and

17 Deltravis Williams. I too am a super voter

20 give you a little history lesson. 1868, I
21 believe, our Constitution was written. My
22 great grandfather was a slave and for me to be
23 standing here 100 -- almost 100 years later,
24 200 years later in front of this commission, it
25 is to me humbling. My great grandfather which

8 Joyner, my spirits lifted up. Restoration of

14 When I register voters, and I registered
15 thousands of voters over of the years, the
16 first thing I get from my people is -- is I
17 can't get my rights back because I'm waiting on
18 the government. We have independent
19 commission. Politics needs to be out of this.
20 I mean, these people have served their time in
21 jail and they get out, they have had enough it
22 is trying to get a job, but they can't get
23 their rights back. I mean, come on. We're
24 tired --

4 MR. GUTIERREZ: I don't know if I can go
5 after Deltravis, but I'm going to try. My name
6 is Manuel Ernesto Gutierrez. I'm here today as
7 a veteran, a father, and proud Floridian. Our
8 state Constitution gives you an immense power
9 to review our charter. My theme for you today
10 is impartiality and to make Floridians lives
11 better. You should strive to make gains so the
12 Constitution for Floridians and -- I charge you
13 to look at revisions that disenfranchise,
14 oppress, or left behind Floridians like the
15 1968 criminal disenfranchisement provision of
16 voters. Disgregation -- Constitution provision
17 by some accounts have left 1.6 to 2.3 million
18 voters in Florida without the right to vote.
19 That's about 10 percent of the population.
20 We're only one in five states that still has
21 this segregation era provision in our
22 Constitution. And with all due respect to

8 MR. VELEZ: Mr. Chairman, members of the
9 commission. I am Roberto Velez with the
10 Christian Family Coalition of Florida. We
11 represent over 500,000 pro-life voters in the
12 state and we are here to address Article 1,
13 Section 22, privacy clause of the Florida State
14 Constitution. Although the original intent of
15 the privacy clause was to protect the people
16 from government surveillance, the courts have
17 misconstrued this article and have erroneously
18 applied it to the issue of abortion. And have
19 therefore tied the hands of the people and
20 their elected state representatives to enact
21 public policy addressing this crucial issue.
22 For example, the Florida state legislator
23 recently enacted a 24 hour waiting period
24 before an Abortion. This is a reasonable law
25 adopted by 27 other states and upheld by the

8 you remedy this situation by allowing the
9 people of Florida to clarify in the state

9 always tell people that in the many of mental
10 health, I've never had a patient who came into
11 my office depressed because they forgot about
12 trigonometry from 9th grade, or anxious because
13 they don't remember who fought in World War I.
14 The reasons they come in depressed are other
15 reasons that we never teach in schools.
16 Depression, suicide is the 10th leading cause
17 of death in the general population and is the
18 third leading cause of death in children.
19 Substance abuse is another reason why they come
20 into my office. In the past 6 years, heroin
21 has become the -- the death of heroin causes
22 have quadrupled in the past 6 years. So we
23 have these horrendous statistics going on, and
24 we still do not integrate emotional literacy
25 into the school system. I think it's the right

2 Harvard in 2006 the class that was packed all

3 commission. My name is Farbod Tehranian. I
4 have voted in every election since I've
5 registered at age 18 and one thing that's
6 always bothered me every election is the fact
7 that we live in a closed primary state. To me
8 that is a very anti-democratic system. And I'm
9 very grateful to say that I actually work for
10 an organization called Progress For All that
11 actually recently conducted a statewide poll
12 with open primaries, a national leader on
13 election form, as well as Florida Fair and Open
14 Primaries, a grass roots organization dedicated
15 to enacting open primaries in Florida. So a
16 couple of stats from this poll, which you guys
17 can check out at Progressforall.org if you want
18 some proof, 74 percent of Floridians want
19 independent voters, 74 percent. That's 27
20 percent of the Florida electorate. That's a
21 large chunk included in primary elections. And
22 73 percent of Floridians, now this includes
23 super majorities of republican, democrat, and
24 independent voters, want the Constitutional
25 Revision Commission, you guys, to put an open

2 the people talking, that's not just me. Also,

25 two meetings here, but that honestly really

8 judiciary. I'm asking you not to engage in
9 proposals that will pose judicial term limits.
10 There is no state of the union that imposes
11 judicial term limits. Florida will be the
12 first. The reason there are no states is
13 because it's a recipe for disaster. There --
14 you will not be able to track brilliant legal
15 minds that have successful practices if they're
16 going to know that they're going to be booted
17 off the bench in one or two terms. You're
18 going to lose experienced judges just as those
19 good judges are getting ready to become great
20 judges. You're going to have inexperienced
21 judges in there which will lead to inconsistent
22 decisions. It will create a lot of confusion.
23 Our supreme court decides on life and death
24 decisions. We need experienced judges in
25 there. Now more than ever we need an

15 addresses the protection of natural resources
16 and scenic beauty. We are the most vulnerable
17 state to sea level rise, but we are 26 in use
18 of solar energy. We spend 100,000 per day
19 buying fossil fuel from other states, but
20 ironically we are the sunshine state. So here
21 are several things or several suggestions: We
22 can put a price on carbon and share fees with
23 the citizens, we can mandate that energy
24 companies assist Floridians to reach goals for
25 renewable energy, tax incentives could help us

12 advance. A couple of things I'd like to talk
13 about. I guess I'll start with open primaries.

14 We're just 1 of 14 states that have closed
15 primaries. This past election, for example,
16 3.2 million registered independent voters in

8 come out publically and forcefully against the
9 so-called Senate Bill 10 and we do believe that
10 this properly belongs in the legislative
11 sphere, but we think that Senator Negron and
12 House Speaker Corcoran legislation which has
13 been scaled back a couple times already to
14 basically commit over a billion dollars of
15 state funds to build a massive reservoir south
16 of Lake Okeechobee that would require the
17 acquisition of over 65,000 acres of highly
18 productive agricultural layer is misguided on
19 many levels. First of all, there's plenty of
20 land already in that Everglades agricultural
21 area for which there are not funds to build
22 projects on.

23 MS. GAMEZ: Thank you.

24 MR. GUTIERREZ: So we believe that it's
25 important that we follow the science and we

2 program and we finish the job accordingly.
3 Thank you very much.

4 MS. BOSWORTH: Hi, my name is Cathy
5 Bosworth and I'm from Islamorada in the
6 beautiful Florida keys, and I'm a proud public
7 high school teacher retired. And after that --
8 all in South Florida, and after that I stayed
9 out -- and went back and started teaching in
10 community college because I love young people
11 and I love to work with them. I've spent a
12 lifetime with young people and I want to talk
13 to you about a glitch that I see in our voter
14 registration system. When my own children were
15 in high school, at the end of their government
16 class their teacher would register them to vote
17 and I thought that was a wonderful thing. It
18 was the culmination of their class. But now I
19 see that at Coral Shores High School the
20 government teacher is not allowed to register
21 her students to vote even though she would
22 really like to. The only person in Monroe
23 County who can register students to vote is the
24 supervisor of elections who -- for 120 miles,
25 that's a long way to go to register students,

1 and it doesn't happen very often. I think that
2 government teachers should be allowed to finish
3 their course with an invitation to their
4 students to become part of the community of
5 voters and I don't see why that was ever
6 changed, and I'd like to propose an amendment
7 to change it back. Thank you very much.

8 MS. GAMEZ: Commissioner Daniella Lavine
9 Cava, Gerald Cope, Jr., and Felicia Robinson.

10 MS. CAVA: Good evening, commissioners.
11 Thank you very much for coming to South Florida
12 for this important occasion. I think it's very
13 aspiring to have so many members of the public
14 here today to speak about their concerns, and
15 every 20 years, that's very important, so I
16 thank you for your attention to everybody's
17 issues. And I'm here to speak briefly on four
18 matters. I'm the county commissioner for
19 district 8 which is South Dade, shared with
20 Commissioner Moss, district 9, and very, very
21 proud to be here.

22 First of all, basic rights of all
23 Floridians. Article 1, Section 2 on basic
24 rights says that all natural persons are people
25 before the law. And the declarations of

1 Section 2 are in direct conflict with Section
2 27 which deprives certain Floridians the right
3 to marry. Section 27 was also rendered
4 unconstitutional and should be removed from our
5 document. Additionally, all Floridians are
6 citizens of the United States and should have
7 the right to vote. Florida is only one of a
8 handful of states that does not automatically
9 restore voting rights to its citizen. And
10 unsurprisingly, according to the -- charitable
11 trust has the largest percentage of
12 disenfranchised citizens in the entire nation.

13 The people of Florida should have the
14 explicit right to a clean environment in which
15 to live and work. A right to clean air to
16 breathe and clean water to drink should be a
17 basic right for all Floridians. And that we
18 should recognize that the waters of Florida
19 belong to the people of Florida and cannot be
20 owned by anyone but the state and local
21 governments.

22 That was my first point. My second point
23 is preservation of citizen's initiatives in the
24 Constitution. Besides those provisions in the
25 Florida Constitution found by the U.S. Supreme

1 Court to contradict -- or found by the supreme
2 court to contradict the U.S. Constitution any
3 amendments that were passed pursuant to the
4 voters of the state should remain untouched.

5 MS. GAMEZ: Thank you.

6 MS. CAVA: My third point is preservation
7 of home rule of the Miami-Dade government.
8 I'll be very short. We have a home rule
9 charter, we have a charter reform commission.
10 We've asked for a member of the Dade delegation
11 to participate and we'd like it to be honored.

12 And finally, renewable energy requirements
13 and preserve the right to self generate. So
14 this has been found to be the law here through
15 the Constitution, but we're one of only 13
16 states --

17 MS. GAMEZ: Thank you.

18 MS. CAVA: -- that doesn't have a
19 renewable energy goal. Thank you. I have
20 copies for you as well. Thank you.

21 MR. COPE: Hi, I'm Gerald Cope. I'm an
22 attorney in private practice in Miami, but
23 previously I was a judge in the Third District
24 Court of Appeals which actually is physically
25 located not far from here where I served for 22

1 years and I served as chief judge of that
2 court. My speculation is that sometime in the
3 next year and a half this body will be asked to
4 consider a proposal to impose term limits on
5 judges. I am here to tell you that based on my
6 experience as a judge, I would urge you not to
7 adopt such a proposal. I have left with the
8 staff a letter which outlines my reasoning in
9 more detail than I have time to give here, but
10 quickly, four points. One, being a judge is a
11 profession like any other profession, and with
12 time and experience you learn the job better,
13 you do it better, you do it more effectively.
14 One of the term proposals that's been voiced is
15 a 12 year term. That would put judges in a
16 position where they're just hitting their
17 stride and they're out the door replaced with
18 someone who is a beginner. A corollary of
19 that, when you're trying to recruit judges
20 either to run or to be appointed, you would be
21 put in a position where you would be talking to
22 an attorney with a thriving practice with
23 clientele saying, gee, we'd sure like for you
24 to run for judge or be appointed judge for this
25 temporary judicial position, you can close up

1 list of counties across the state, I am pleased
2 to be here today and share a unified message.
3 The sunshine state has 412 cities, towns, and
4 villages, each one different from the next.
5 But one thing all the cities have in common is
6 the commitment to the home rule as known as
7 local control. Preserving the home rule is a
8 top priority for the Florida League of Cities,
9 and the Miami-Dade League of Cities, and for
10 the City of Miami Gardens, and for me
11 personally. As a local elected official I have
12 seen the importance of local government and
13 first hand experience of what it can do. In
14 the City of Miami Gardens we're a city of just
15 14 years old, and with being there, we've been
16 able to increase our economics, the health

23 feedback, and ultimately craft a solution that
24 will benefit our residents for years to come.

9 uniform education. I am also an educator and
10 it's very important that across the state and
11 across this country that we have a uniform
12 education for our kids. And then also I do
13 support us having restoration rights for
14 convicted felons.

16 we're going to take a five minute break. Mr.
17 Chairman, five minute break?

2 As mentioned before, I'm Commissioner
3 Smith, former state senator from Broward
4 County. I mention to say I will mess up a lot
5 of your names, so please charge it to my head
6 and not my heart. We're going to start with

11 I ask you to include a constitutional right to
12 vote in Florida and for that right to be
13 guaranteed and protected. I ask that felons
14 who have completed their sentence have their
15 voting rights restored unconditionally. I note
16 that at least five commission members who would
17 be interested in private for-profit education
18 in some form and therefore want to stress that
19 we need a uniform, efficient, safe, secure and
20 high-quality public education system as
21 provided in Article 9. To ask for fair
22 redistricting standards and to defend the right
23 to privacy as it is currently set out. Thank
24 you. Danielle Goodman.

25 MS. ENRIQUEZ: Good evening. My name is

1 Teresa Enriquez. I'm the executive chief
2 assistant at the Miami-Dade Public Defender's
3 office. I'm here on behalf of Carlos Martinez,
4 our public defender who would have loved to be
5 here tonight addressing the CRC, but
6 unfortunately he's out of town. I am here to
7 ask this commission to put before Florida
8 voters an amendment removing the last two
9 sentences of Article 1, Section 12 of the
10 Florida Constitution. These sentences state
11 that the rights conferred by Section 12 must be
12 construed in conformity with the 4th amendment
13 to the United States Constitution as
14 interpreted by the United States Supreme Court.
15 Articles or information obtained in violation
16 of this right shall not be admissible in
17 evidence if such articles or information would
18 be inadmissible under the decisions of the
19 United States Supreme Court construing the 4th
20 amendment to the United States Constitution.
21 These two sentences minimize Florida's
22 independence in our federal structure by
23 preventing Florida from serving as a, quote,
24 laboratory democracy. This phrase point by
25 Supreme Court Justice Louis Brandeis recognizes

1 several great assets of our federal system.
2 Not all solutions can be applied nationally.
3 The sovereign states are and should be entitled
4 to test remedies to social -- on a local level.
5 And what is best for one region of the United
6 States is not necessarily best for others.
7 These powerful arguments in favor of federalism
8 are explicitly rejected by the last two
9 sentences of the Florida provision. Floridians
10 have a strong history of opposition to
11 unreasonable and unnecessary government
12 intrusion in our daily lives. What works in
13 California, Montana, New York, or Washington
14 D.C. doesn't necessarily work here. We should
15 not limit our freedoms to the minimal standards
16 of the federal 4th amendment as told to us by
17 the U.S. Supreme Court. We should instead
18 proudly assert our independence and the right
19 to be our own masters. Thank you very much.

20 MR. SMITH: Thank you. We have Dr. Maria
21 Peiro, Charles Fischer, and Maria Luisa
22 Castellanos.

23 MS. PEIRO: Good afternoon. Dr. Maria
24 Peiro. I am here to propose an amendment to
25 make e-verify mandatory in the State of

1 Florida. There is certainly a case to be made
2 to have this amendment placed on our ballot.
3 Consider these findings. About one in 5
4 Miami-Dade households lives in poverty.
5 Miami-Dade leads the pack nationally on the
6 poverty scale. Only about 40 percent of the
7 county's population earns enough to live
8 comfortably. And about 149,000 children lived
9 in poverty in Miami-Dade in 2013. The before
10 mentioned findings are pertinent to our
11 amendment because low wages, unemployment, and
12 poverty in Miami-Dade are directly product to
13 the law of supply and demand. There is a
14 direct link to the large influx of illegal
15 labor as the cost for wage depression and
16 unemployment. The group most negatively
17 affected by illegal labor are low skilled
18 workers, and many of whom who are Black or
19 Hispanic, and many of whom are -- legal
20 immigrants. It also drives up welfare and
21 Medicaid numbers, and the tax payer is left to
22 foot the bill for more social services.
23 Mandatory e-verify will help improve job
24 opportunities and wages for the legal residents
25 of Florida by screening illegal workers out of

1 our workforce. As a summary of our amendment
2 reads, effective on July of the year following
3 passage of this amendment by the voters, all
4 Florida employers who hold business licenses
5 shall verify the employment eligibility of all
6 new employees to the U.S. Department of
7 Homeland Security's e-verify system. Our
8 proposed e-verify amendment has already been
9 approved by the State of Florida. The format
10 and the wording has already been approved. As
11 you travel throughout our state, you will hear
12 from other citizens in other parts of Florida
13 who support our e-verify amendment. It is my
14 hope that you will seriously consider placing
15 this work -- amendment on the 2018 ballot --

16 MR. SMITH: Thank you.

17 MS. PEIRO: -- and finally give the voters
18 of Florida an opportunity to decide. I left
19 hard copies of the amendment for you up front.
20 Thank you.

21 MR. SMITH: Thank you.

22 MR. FISCHER: Hi, my name is Charles
23 Fischer. I live in Miami Beach. Thank you
24 guys first in the meantime listening to
25 everyone. I -- I'm speaking on three voting

2 One, repeating my support for the
3 automatic voting -- restoration of voting
4 rights for people who have previously been
5 convicted of felonies. And an interesting data
6 point on that is 25 percent of all adults in
7 this country who are not able to vote live in
8 the State of Florida. It's a -- black mark on
9 our democracy.

10 Two, I'm strongly support of strengthening
11 our -- voting districts in Florida. That is --
12 a lot of people have said that already.

13 And a third point which is -- all right,
14 it's a little off the wall, but in Miami-Dade
15 County we do -- we have run off voting which
16 prevents people from getting elected with the
17 minority support. It also is the way people
18 vote in Louisiana. And just in 2016 the State
19 of Maine decided to switch their voting to
20 instant run off voting as well. So instant run
21 off voting prevents any -- winning without
22 receiving majority support in the polls. So no
23 ones is going to win with 40 percent vote. You
24 can get -- basically you'd have to get forward
25 of 50 percent. It encourages candidates to

2 which reduces partisanship. I think that's a
3 position across the entire state and across the
4 political spectrum. And most importantly, it
5 shows that it reduces -- or it increases voting
6 participation by the general public. So again,
7 it's the future of voting. It's how Maine is
8 doing it now as of last year. The State of
9 Louisiana does a little bit slower version of
10 it. And here in Miami-Dade we have run off
11 voting as well. So I ask you guys to consider
12 and support instant run off elections to make
13 Florida a leader in the electoral process and
14 not where we are today. Thank you.

15 MR. SMITH: We have Maria Castellanos,
16 followed by Claudia D. Pedra (phonetic) -- I'm
17 sorry, I couldn't read that -- Claudia
18 Southwest 124th Street, and Robert Horton.

19 MS. CASTELLANOS: Hi. Mr. Chairman and
20 commissioners, my name is Maria Luisa
21 Castellanos and I've lived in Miami-Dade County
22 for the last 41 years. I came from Cuba as a
23 child in 1961 and I lived in Saint Louis,
24 Missouri, in Rindge, New Hampshire, and Athens,
25 Alabama. I went to high school in Macon,

1 Georgia and then I went to Georgia Tech. I'm a
2 practicing architect and adjunct professor at

7 Macon and not in Cochran, Georgia so that so
8 that I could go to this catholic school. But I
9 think it's really, really important that we
10 preserve our public school system. We cannot
11 afford to drain the money that goes to the
12 public schools and public colleges and instead
13 give it to charter schools and to other for
14 profit schools or any other school, any
15 catholic school or denominational school
16 because honestly all those different schools I
17 went to, I was always a top student. But why
18 was I top student? Because my parents cared.
19 In my house there was magazines, and books, and
20 all kinds of stuff. So that is really the
21 important thing. It's -- that the children
22 have access to other resources, not to put them
23 in a different school. If they want to do
24 that, if the parents want to put their children
25 in a catholic school, fine, let them pay for

9 represent millions of union workers here in the
10 State of Florida. We are high quality
11 technicians, electricians, whatever type of job
12 that is done by county workers, whether it be
13 the airport, the seaport, teachers, our
14 firemen, our policemen. We work at these jobs
15 for the benefits of collective bargaining,
16 okay. If it wasn't for collective bargaining,
17 our employers could fire us at any minute, they
18 could take away all of our benefits that we
19 enjoy, that we raise our children on, that we
20 have a pension. We have benefits that when we
21 retire, we can retire comfortably, not
22 extravagant. We're just asking for a civil
23 type of retirement when we get to that age.
24 But without collective bargaining, and I've
25 seen it, I have friends, I have family who work

1 jobs that there is no collective bargaining and
2 they walk on eggshells every single day of
3 their life when they go to work. They don't
4 know if they're going to have a vacation, if

8 it's so important in the State of Florida to
9 maintain it.

10 MR. SMITH: Thank you, sir. We have
11 Patrick Jovanov, Dwight -- Senator Dwight
12 Bullard, and Brett Rothfield.

13 MR. JOVANOV: Patrick Jovanov, Pompano
14 Beach, Florida. Florida is number 1 for
15 incarcerated children on death row. Florida
16 has over 400 death row inmates who were
17 children when they were convicted. The
18 overwhelming cause of these horrific acts and
19 events are intentional and deliberate
20 government policies. Deliberate policies to
21 deny and deprive children of education and
22 social development. Deliberate policies to
23 alienate parents, deprive children of available
24 instructional material. In 1974 at Pompano
25 Beach High School I had to steal my books. I

1 had to sign for the books. Books that my
2 school administrators threw away into the
3 garbage before I could get to them. Today in
4 2017 in Pompano Beach nothing has changed. My
5 children and thousands of other children in

8 per child school spending. According to
9 Superintendent Carvalho, the U.S. is number 27
10 in academic standing. I ask this commission to
11 examine child abuse in Florida. Thank you
12 kindly.

13 MR. SMITH: Thank you.

14 MR. BULLARD: Former state Senator Dwight
15 Bullard. Good to see a few of my former
16 colleagues up there as well. Simply put, is
17 that accurate a little weird being on this side
18 of this mic in the sense that you really get to
19 see the level of bias as it pertains to
20 education. And I hate to be that guy, but I'm
21 going to be that guy for the moment. There are
22 no former public school teachers on this panel,
23 there are no former principals, college
24 professors, et cetera. But you do have a
25 handful of folks directly involved with the

2 privatization of education, directly involved
3 with 100 percent voting records on

9 Uniformity is in fact public, public, as an
10 open access uniform the ability for all folks
11 to access regardless of disability or in
12 occasion gender or race. And I want to spend a
13 couple seconds talking about that because every
14 20 years the Constitution Revision Commission
15 comes around and I would argue that decades
16 after decades after decades of doing this
17 process that it was viewed through a very
18 particular racial lens on some of the
19 decisions -- put into this Constitution,
20 including the provision put in 1868 that
21 prohibit the voting rights of folks who have
22 returned as citizens. What I would say to you
23 all up here is you all have a responsibility,
24 almost if you will a constitutional
25 responsibility to be very particular about

1 issue, there is an exception for campaign

9 true. Florida has our fair district rules
10 which encourage better districting. We all owe
11 an incredible debt to the League of Women of
12 Voters for carrying their crusade all the way
13 to the Florida Supreme Court and winning the
14 battle for our state's citizens. The good is
15 the enemy of great, and in this case the rules
16 on the books are good. As we have seen the
17 process the League of Women Voters went through
18 was costly and arduous, we cannot fight that
19 fight again, much less continue to fight the
20 fight on a continuous basis. We shouldn't need
21 to rely on organizations as wonderful as the
22 League of Women Voters fighting this battle for
23 the judicial branch. Additionally we saw the

2 clear the unruliness of the legislature who

9 answer that we need. We cannot be legislators
10 versus citizens or legislators versus the
11 judiciary. I do not blame legislators for

15 states already using independent redistricting
16 committees. They're all seeing success in
17 making elections more competitive and
18 legislative bodies that are more representative
19 and accountable to their citizens. I'm
20 thankful to live in a state that is already on
21 the right path -- fair districting rules in the
22 Constitution, but ask that we not rest on
23 our -- or fall behind in the cause. We must
24 continue to lead and push for even better rules
25 to guarantee that all of my fellow Floridians

8 commission for giving me this opportunity to
9 speak. My name is Stephen Bittel. I am the
10 chairman of the Florida Democratic Party. I'm
11 also a native of Miami and a product of our
12 public schools in Miami years 1 through 12.
13 I'm here to ask you to consider the abolishment
14 by constitutional amendment of the death
15 penalty. This is a historic and barbaric
16 punishment that every study ever done has shown

15 gentlemen of the commission. My name is Juan
16 Carlos Porras. And I am a direct impact of
17 charter schools and school choice. I am now a
18 sophomore here at FIU and I am now the chairman
19 for the FIU College Republicans here on campus.
20 Now, coming from a low income household, I know
21 firsthand what it is to struggle through a
22 professionally failing public school. And if
23 it wasn't for my parents, you know, instilling

24 Americans who do not have that ability and, you
25 know -- I live in Homestead. I've been here --

8 say that you can't vote and you can't do
9 anything else about it. So thank you very much

13 right. My name is Tom Walliger. I'm from
14 Pompano Beach, Florida. The American's for
15 Disability Act is not, again, I say, is not an
16 enumerated power of the U.S. Constitution.
17 Regulations of persons with disabilities not
18 being an enumerated power falls to the state.
19 It is the state's right and duty. The Florida
20 Constitution must reaffirm its claim of state's
21 rights and sovereignty and supercede the
22 Federal Americans for Disability Act. This
23 action will allow Florida counties and cities
24 zoning, planning, and code enforcement over
25 sober homes with reasonable regulation and

9 would have very, very small class sizes under
10 20 children, and then the next class would be a
11 regular class and I'd have over 30 children in
12 that class. I can't do that. Stopped being a
13 teacher, became a photographer.

15 next point touches very close to home. I was
16 born and raised in Miami and I've worked in the
17 Everglades as research for a research company
18 and I'd be three hours into the Everglades on

9 else who would like to have it on their own

15 Brett Rothfield and Claudia who lives on
16 Southwest 124th Street -- okay. Go ahead, sir.

17 MR. IGORZABOL: Hello, my name is Juan
18 Igorzabol. I am a student at FIU, and even
19 though I was born in Argentina, I was raised
20 most of my life in Miami and consider myself an
21 American. I agree with past speakers that we
22 should allow a felon to be able to -- to have
23 their right to vote. I wanted to be able to
24 talk more about the issue. Number 1, the
25 government has to affirm our right, not give us

15 removed. The same has to be able to account
16 people who even -- committed felonies. For
17 example, I've been working -- I worked in many
18 churches and I've seen that many pastors even
19 have cleaned up, have a good life that they
20 can't be able to vote, and I find this to be
21 extremely unconstitutional. The second issue
22 about the giving felons the right to vote is
23 about racism. Even though 10 percent of felons
24 live in Florida, 1 out of 4 people who are

8 almost 50 years ago, and I was born and raised
9 here in Miami, Florida. So all of the alien

14 was the first to adapt the alien land law which
