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30	care. The legislature is not limited from enacting and funding
31	programs using public and private providers, without regard to
32	the religious nature of any provider or participant,
33	notwithstanding this Article, Article IX, section 1, or any
34	other provision of this Constitution.
35	(b) This section is self-executing and shall not create an
36	entitlement to a publicly-financed program which is not provided
37	by law.
38	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the following statement be

40	CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
41	ARTICLE I, SECTION 27
42	FREEDOM TO CHOOSE AMONG PUBLIC AND PRIVATE PROVIDERS OF
43	PUBLIC SERVICES Provisions of the State Constitution limit the
44	power of the government to fund or use private or sectarian
45	entities to provide public services. This proposed
46	constitutional amendment supersedes those limits. Under the
47	amendment, individuals, as permitted by law, may choose among
48	public and private or sectarian providers of state-funded public
49	services for services such as health care and education.
50	However, the amendment will not authorize funding that advances
51	or endorses a religion.
