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MR. LEMIEUX: If you could take your seats, Good afternoon. Thank you for coming please. This is the opening meeting of the taxation and budget reform commission. My name is I'm the chief of staff to George LeMieux. Governor Crist. And on behalf of Governor Crist and Senate President Pruitt and Speaker Rubio, welcome and thank you for your service.

What we are going to try to provide for you today is road map of your obligations to try to get you started on your processes and procedures as required by the constitution and state statutes, and then turn the baton over to you so that you can be organized and run and fulfill your constitutional obligations.

You have a binder in front of you, or you should have a binder in front of you, which I will refer to in sort of this overview of your responsibilities and the requirements.

And if you would first look at tab three, that will give you a sense of the constitutional authority. You are

24	constitutional officers of the State of Florida
25	upon taking the oath that you will receive from

1	Justice Quince in a few moments. And that
2	comes with a lot of responsibilities and a lot
3	of powers as the constitution sets forth. And
4	we will go through those today, both in terms
5	of the Sunshine Law, in terms of ethical
6	requirements, in terms of the obligations which
7	are put upon you by the constitution and
8	Florida statutes.

Let me just briefly go over what article

11, section six, which is provided for you in
tab three, charges you to do as the tax and
budget reform commission. You are charged to
examine the state budgetary process, and if you
look at subsection D it basically has this
overview, which I will summarize. You are
charged to examine the revenue needs and the
expenditure process of the state, the
appropriateness of the tax structure of the
state, the governmental productivity and
efficiency, constitutional limitations on
taxation, and expenditures at the state and
local level.

You are also charged to review policy as

governmental operations and capital facilities and those requirements to meet the state's needs during the next 20 years.

You are also asked to review the state's comprehensive planning, budgeting, and needs assessment process to determine whether the resulting information adequately supports a strategic decision-making process.

Finally you are asked to determine methods favored by the citizens of the state to fund the needs of the state, including alternate alternative methods of raising sufficient funds for the needs of the state, and measures that could be instituted to effectively gather funds from existing tax sources.

The constitution also says that you may in your discretion hold public hearings as you deem necessary. It requires you to issue a report of your, of what you find and make to the Legislature any recommendations for statutory changes related to the taxation or budgetary laws.

You are required to file with the

24	custodian	of	state	recoi	ds,	which	is	the
25	Secretary	of	State	, any	proj	osals	for	changing

1	the constitution of the State of Florida, which
2	is ultimately the mandate of this organization
3	if the appropriate majority, two-thirds
4	majority of this organization, finds that there

should be changes to the constitution.

Now, under the size of this organization there are 25 members and the constitution provides that it requires a two-thirds vote of the full commission to put something on the ballot. And two-thirds does not mean a quorum,

There are 25 of you who are voting members for ex officio. We have put together a team of mathematicians to figure out two-thirds of 25, having been a lawyer and not knowing math, and it came out to 16.6, which seems to be an interesting number, so we're going to go with 17 as the number that you will need.

it means two-thirds of the entire commission.

That's certainly something that you can evaluate further when you obtain legal counsel, but we believe that that's the appropriate number of votes you need to put something on the ballot.

24	You are authorized to hire personnel and
25	incur expenses, and there are funds that have

L	been appropriated for that purpose for this
2	budget year and we are recommending, along with
3	the cooperation of the House and Senate funds
1	for the following years.

You are entitled to per diem and travel reimbursement in pursuit of your obligations on this commission, and you will have an administrative staff that you will hire probably through your chairman, and they are assigned to the state board of education where they will be administratively housed.

You also have the power to issue subpoenas if you deem necessary pursuant to state statute.

In terms of your time lines, you must file, if you do vote by two-thirds for any changes to the constitution to be put before the people, you must file with the Secretary of State those revisions by May 8th of 2008. And there is a tab in your binder which contains this time line.

And you are charged to cease your operations no later than June 30th of 2010.

24	From today that means you have roughly 14
25	months to submit any constitutional proposals

- for the 2008 general election ballot.
- 2 Just a couple of housekeeping measures.

3 Some of you are elected officials, members of

4 the judiciary. You do not violate the dual

5 office-holding prohibition by serving on this

6 commission. You normally would but there is a

7 specific exemption in the state constitution

8 for service on this constitutional commission.

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You will be required to take an oath, the same oath that our elected officials take, and that will be administered shortly.

You are bound by the code of ethics for public officers and employees found in Florida Statute 112.313. There will be a presentation on that today. You will probably, I would presume, want to seek more information about that at your coming meetings.

You are required to file financial disclosure forms if you have not done so already. And I would encourage you to file those if you haven't done so this coming week.

And I also wanted to let you know that in the past there have been websites that have

- been dedicated to the work of these type of
- 25 bodies. There is still one posted for the last

1	full constitutional revision commission. That
2	can be found at www.law.fsu.edu\crc, and we can
3	provide that website to you.

There will be a transcript created as you can tell from the young lady to my left of today's proceedings.

In conclusion, before I ask for the role to be called and ask for Justice Quince to swear you in as officers, I wanted to say that I think everyone here realizes the important work you are about to engage in.

I think I can speak on behalf of the governor and the Senate president and the speaker, because I know they have made these comments publicly, that the people of our state are suffering under taxes and there's really could not have been a better time for this commission to have come forward for our constitution.

So good luck in your work. We are here to support and help you. Members of the governor's staff along with cooperation from the House and Senate have done our best to

organize this meeting today, and we'll help in the transition as you select a chairman, as you

- hire staff.
- We are here and available to you to
- 3 provide whatever help that you need to get you
- 4 on your way, and understanding that today is
- 5 really a transitionary meeting until you have
- 6 selected your officers and are able to fulfill
- 7 your obligations.

JUSTICE QUINCE: Good afternoon. If all of
you would stand and raise your right hand. And I
want you to know on behalf of the people of the
State of Florida that we are looking forward to
the work that you will do on this commission.

And repeat after me. I do solemnly swear or affirm that I will support, protect, and defend the constitution and government of the United States and of the State of Florida, that I am duly qualified to hold office under the constitution of the state and that I will well and faithfully perform the duties of a member of the taxation and budget reform commission on which I am now about to enter, so help me God.

Congratulations to all of you.

(Committee members sworn.)

MR. LEMIEUX: At this time it's appropriate for me, having gotten you started on this process, now that you have been sworn in, to allow you to begin this meeting and take over the reins, and to do that you need to elect a chairman. I would like to entertain any nominations for chairman of the commission. Mr. Martinez.

MR. MARTINEZ: Mr. LeMieux, at this point in time I would like to nominate Mr. Allan Bense.

1	MR. LEMIEUX: Is there a second on the
2	nomination?
3	MR. SCOTT: Second.
4	MR. LEMIEUX: Senator Scott seconds the
5	nomination. Are there any other nominations?
6	MR. LEVINE: Move to close nominations.
7	MR. LEMIEUX: There's a motion on the floor
8	to close nominations. All in favor say aye.
9	(Ayes unanimous.)
10	MR. LEMIEUX: The motions are closed for
11	nominations for chairman of the commission. All
12	in favor of Speaker Allan Bense for chairman of
13	the taxation and budget reform commission please
14	signify by saying aye.

16	MR. LEMIEUX: Mr. Chairman, congratulations.
17	The meeting is yours.
18	CHAIRMAN BENSE: I don't know how to use the
19	mike anymore. I forgot where Morris Hall was to
20	be honest with you. I haven't been here in a long
21	time.
22	But first of all, thank you for your trust

and your vote to elect me chairman of this

- 24 commission. Before I left office I will tell
- you that the only thing I really asked the

1	incoming and current speaker Marco Rubio was to
2	be considered to be on this commission because
3	of the importance of this commission.

It is a very, very powerful commission and I think it needs -- I look around to see who the members are serving with me here and you're all players. You're all, this is the cream of the cream in Florida. And I want to make sure that whatever we do we do in a very deliberate manner, a very thoughtful manner.

And as speaker of the house I tried to be as open and inclusive of both parties as I could. And I have no agenda. I will tell all of you up front I have no personal agenda in this. I'm not a lobbyist. I'm in business now again.

So I just want to make sure that we understand the power this commission has and that whatever we do that we do it in a very thoughtful and deliberate manner. And sometimes I may go so slow it may make you a little boring but, or maybe boring, but I've never been a home run hitter. I've been a

- little singles hitter in the doubles, so I'll
- do the best I can to lead this commission in a

- very, in a manner that you can be proud of. So thank you again for your vote.
- 3 And having said that, I think the
- 4 constitution also provides for a vice chairman,
- 5 and I would like to suggest that my long-time
- friend Jim Scott, who is former president of
- 7 the Florida Senate, be elected vice chairman of
- 8 this commission. And I would accept a motion
- 9 for him to be --
- 10 MR. MILLER: Mr. Chair, I'll make that
- 11 motion.
- 12 MR. MARTINEZ: Second.
- 13 CHAIRMAN BENSE: Okay. Mr. Miller makes the
- 14 motion and Mr. Martinez seconds it. Are there any
- other nominations for vice chair? Seeing none,
- 16 all in favor of Jim Scott being -- Senator Scott
- 17 being vice chair say aye.
- 18 (Ayes unanimous.)
- 19 All opposed no. Motion carries.
- I also want to thank the staff of the, the
- 21 executive staff of the governor's office for
- 22 organizing this. You know, technically the
- Board of Regents was the group that organized

this back in 1990 and since there's no longer a
Board of Regents we're sort of on the fly, but

1	George LeMieux specifically stepped up to the
2	plate and set up this meeting today and had it
3	staffed as best we can. So thank you very much
4	for your efforts and your hard work in getting
5	us started.

At this time I would like to introduce Mr. Christian Weiss with the Governor's Office of Policy and Budget to provide an overview of previous taxation and budget reform commission outcomes. And when we're done with that I would be thinking about, obviously we have to organize -- the constitution requires that we do a lot of things today, frankly things that we have not had time to do or prepare for since we had no organization at all.

And I've got some thoughts on how we may want to move forward from today, but be thinking about that and we'll discuss that along with a few other things as soon Mr. Weiss is done. Mr. Weiss, you're recognized.

MR. WEISS: Thank you, Mr. Chair, members of the commission. I have been asked to briefly go over the adoption, adopted constitutional

- 24 amendments and some of the recommendations of the
- 25 1990 through '92 commissions.

1	The only constitutional amendment that
2	actually is in the constitution today that
3	passed in 1992 is the budget reform, which is
4	found in article three, section 19. It is
5	governing many, many of the items in the
6	current appropriations process. And you see
7	the annual budgeting, the 72-hour review
8	period, trust fund, special votes, and the
9	review period, and last but not least the
10	budget stabilization fund that is 5 percent of
11	the previous years. General revenue is in that
12	one.

The commission also adopted two more constitutional amendments, the local option sales tax for cities and counties that was defeated by roughly a three to one margin in the 1992 election, and the ad valorem taxation of government leaseholds.

That particular amendment was actually on the ballot because it was too late to take it off the ballot, but the Florida Supreme Court found that the ballot language was defective and removed it.

24	A variety of other recommendations were
25	adopted by the commission in a long series of

1	publications. They talked about repeal of
2	state tax exemptions. Most of that was meant
3	to be revenue neutral, not to be a revenue
4	raiser, broaden the sales tax base to services,
5	tax all business entities, and lower rates and
6	broaden the gross receipts tax, a
7	recommendation for the Legislature to explore a
8	lower rate value added tax and even a limited
9	state income tax.

Other recommendations include the state revenue cap. That one was actually adopted by the Legislature in 1994 and subsequently voted into the constitution. It was not voted on in 1992 as a constitutional amendment by this commission, the previous commission.

Improving taxpayer compliance, a couple of issues were in that one. The Ryce program was subsequently implemented by the Department of Revenue and by the statute in section 213, an integrated data processing system, the sun tax system in the Department of Revenue, and the taxpayer bill of rights, which was adopted by the Legislature in 1992.

24	The commission also recommended for
25	long-range state revenue and expenditure

1	projections, something that the Legislature
2	adopted in 2006 and got voted in in last
3	November's election.

They talked about lottery refunds to go directly to school and allow school choice and state government accountability, something that was implemented in, by the Legislature through the creation of OPPAGA, or the Office of Policy and Program Analysis -- forgot the G.

They also recommended executive budget authority, which was an outcome after a lawsuit against the cuts that were necessary after the 1991, '92 recession, talked about greater flexibility with the tax structure on local governments, and wanted to have greater flexibility for school districts to levy discretionary millages. In addition they recommended that the non-voted capital millage would be increased to two and a half mills.

The two-mill existing tax was, existing tax was, had a repeal date of 1995. In 1994 the Legislature chose to reenact the two-mill tax.

24	Local government financial reporting, they
25	recommended that the function be moved away

1	from the chief financial officer today to the
2	advisory council on their governmental relation
3	today. It's a joint legislative committee.
4	Modernized reporting and auditor general
5	reports. None of that was implemented except
6	probably the modernizing reporting.
7	And lastly, very apropos in today's, they
8	looked at the homestead exemption revision.
9	Their recommendation was everybody should
10	contribute something. So tax the first
11	50 percent of \$50,000 and then between \$200,000
12	and \$250,000. They recommended for this
13	exemption to be phased out.
14	They recommended that the state mandates
15	provision, which is a provision that requires
16	super majority votes if the state imposes
17	mandates on local government to be implemented
18	by the Legislature. That was implemented by a
19	memo between the presiding offices in the early
20	'90s.
21	And they recommended a special district
22	review that should happen every ten years.

And with that I would be happy to answer

- any questions if you have any.
- 25 CHAIRMAN BENSE: Questions? Seeing none,

- 1 thank you, Mr. Weiss.
- 2 Members, in your packet you're going to
- 3 find the rules of procedure from the 1990
- 4 commission. You may want to take a look at
- 5 that. I think it's important for this
- 6 commission to have sufficient time to review
- 7 and consider proposed amendments using their
- 8 former rules as a road map. They're very
- 9 complex. And we can do this before our next
- 10 meeting.
- In the interim though I would accept a
- motion that for the short run that we adopt
- 13 Robert's rules of orders. Is there a motion?
- MR. HOGAN: So moved.
- 15 MS. BARNETT: Second.
- 16 CHAIRMAN BENSE: Mr. Hogan, and a second by
- 17 Ms. Barnett. All in favor say aye.
- 18 (Ayes unanimous.)

- think we're looking at the staff out there and

case this time because, again, there was n	0
Board of Regents. So I would suggest that	over
the next 30 days that as chairman I assemb	le a

staff.

Also there are a lot of issues out there. If you look at the committees that were formed back in 1990, I think they had four overall committees, and I'm not prepared to go there yet, but I do think that at some point in time in today's meeting, and I will open it up for discussion at this point in time, that we form a committee of some sort to help us get organized.

And that committee can, I would, I would assume that I would sort of oversee that committee. But we need some folks that have some time and effort because we literally have to find space to rent or perhaps one of our arms of government would be happy to give us some space for a while.

19	planning and budgetary processes committee, the
20	governmental procedures and structure
21	committee, and the finance and taxation
22	committee.

Again, I think it's the duty of this

- committee we just set up to -- I'm not so sure
- we follow exactly what they did in 1990, but

- 1 let's come up with a structure that's sound,
 2 that can help us carry out our mission.
- Also, I would recommend, I would welcome
 your input as to staff considerations. I will
 visit with the governor's office, I'll visit
 with the speaker's office, I'll visit with the
 Senate president's office, to see if they have
 some recommendations for an executive director.

I think there's no question we have to have an executive director. And again I think this committee perhaps can hash out staff that we need and then hopefully by the next commission meeting, which we'll talk about in a minute, hopefully will have staff in place.

I would also suggest that -- my thoughts on this commission are that we have a Legislature in place that makes laws and there are two matters in which we can amend the constitution of Florida, as we all know. One is by resolution through the Legislature and the other is by petitions primarily.

So I think that we should let the Legislature do its work for the next 45 days.

- I don't see our role as interfering with their
- job. I really see us as secondary. They were

1	elected by the people, they weren't appointed,
2	so I would recommend that for the next 45 days
3	until session is over that are we really in an
4	organizational mode.

And once session is over let's take a look at what has been accomplished, what looks like might happen in the next year. And technically we can go almost through the end of next session in '08. I think we have to report by May 4th of '08 any proposed amendments to the Secretary of State's office.

So my thoughts are unless you have objections are for us to stay in an organizational mode for the next 45 days. Any thoughts, anyone want to comment on that?

MR. HOGAN: Makes less confusion.

MS. MATHIS: One thought would be to have access to the legislators' public hearings that they are conducting on taxation reform and have access to that information. It would at least be informative to the commission.

CHAIRMAN BENSE: I think that's a good idea.

As we gather staff we'll make sure that that

- information is made available to the members of
- the commission. That's a good idea.

1	Any more input?
2	MR. MILLER: Mr. Chair, if I could. I think
3	looking at the organizational committee, there are
4	some very important things that need to be
5	considered, and one of those is legal counsel.
6	There's going to be a lot of constitutional
7	questions and we need some, so we will be needing
8	to secure outside counsel that has no connection
9	to any of us on the commission.
10	And so I just bring that up. Hopefully
11	the amount of money we've got left for the end
12	of the year would be able to take care of these
13	expenses that will be coming up.
14	We will also have to have some experts in
15	taxation. There are plenty folks that can give
16	us their opinion, but I think we need to be
17	able to have an unbiased opinion brought before
18	us by our own consultants.
19	CHAIRMAN BENSE: Absolutely. Any more
20	observations? Mr. Scott?
21	MR. SCOTT: Well, just that I think your
22	committee, your organizational committee, will

need to sooner rather than later figure out some

- idea about staffing so you can get a budget and
- get the money approved before they leave town.

CHAIRMAN BENSE: I intend to spend a couple days here in Tallahassee next week interviewing potential directors, staff, et cetera. I would really like to get that worked out maybe even before the first meeting of the committee so we can have at least a skeleton staff available for that first meeting.

But I think that, I think that duty rests with me as chairman to find a good qualified staff that can get good work done, and includes legal counsel as well.

Some of them, frankly I've never been one to move quickly so I want to make sure I feel comfortable with those folks. And so, but I do need, we do need to get the staff in place and I will spend a lot of time the next few days working on that for the approval, unless someone has an objection.

Next meeting I thought we would -- before we get to that point, not everyone knows each other. So Bobby Martinez, why don't we go around the room, introduce yourselves, tell us what you do and where you're from.

MR. MARTINEZ: All right. Good afternoon,

everyone. My name is Bob Martinez. I'm from

1	Miami, Florida. I'm a lawyer at the law firm of
2	Colson, Hicks and we do trial work.
3	SENATOR MARGOLIS: Good afternoon. I'm Gwen
4	Margolis. I've been an elected official for 32
5	years, former president of the Senate
6	(Inaudible) I am delighted to be here to be able
7	to
8	MR. LEVINE: Mr. Speaker or Mr. Chairman and
9	others. First of all, I'm thrilled that they
10	selected you to
l 1	CHAIRMAN BENSE: Use your microphones if you
12	would, please, so the court reporter can record
13	you.
L 4	MR. LEVINE: My name is Alan Levine.
15	Mr. Speaker, Mr. Chair, I'm proud the commission
16	selected you unanimously. Couldn't have made a
L 7	better pick. I'm the CEO of the North Broward
18	hospital district, have been there for about eight
19	months.
20	Prior to that I was the secretary of the
21	Florida Agency for Health Care Administration
))	in Governor Rush's administration and then

prior to that had a career in hospital

24 administration. So I'm proud to be a part of 25 it and couldn't be involved with a better group

of people. 1 2 MS. LEVESQUE: Mr. Chairman, I am Patricia 3 Levesque. I'm not going to brown-nose you like my 4 fellow commissioner. 5 6 (Laughter.) 7 I am glad that you are our chairman. the executive director of the Foundation for 8 9 Florida's Future. It is a think tank in public 10 policy advocacy organization founded by Governor Jeb Bush and focusing on education 11 policy. I also do some consulting. 12 13 I have been privileged to live in 14 Tallahassee for about ten years working as a 15 house staffer and then in the governor's office of policy and budget and then as Governor 16 Bush's deputy chief of staff. And I'm honored 17 to serve with you-all. 18 19 MR. KYLE: Mr. Speaker, well, I quess it's Chairman. Old habits die hard. My name is Bruce 20 21 Kyle. I'm a former member of the Legislature. I 22 served eight years in Tallahassee. Currently a

circuit court judge in Hendry -- city and Hendry

24	in Glades County with the general docket covering
25	all the felonies out in that area as well as a

- civil docket.
- MS. JOHNSON: Mr. Chairman, my name is Julia
- Johnson. It's an honor to have the opportunity to
- 4 serve with all of you and under your leadership.
- 5 I am a lawyer, a consulting firm, regulatory
- 6 strategy and legal analysis, Netcommunications.
- 7 Prior to that I served on the Florida Public
- 8 Service Commission for about seven years. Prior
- 9 to that I was an officer of the Department of
- 10 Community Affairs focused on land use issues. And
- it's an honor to be here.
- 12 MR. HOGAN: Mr. Chairman, I don't know if
- 13 this is on or not. Mike Hogan, 25 years with the
- telephone company, eight years in the city council
- in Jacksonville, three years here, which I loved.
- In fact, I almost nominated Gaston Cantens to run
- 17 against you but decided better.
- 18 (Laughter.)
- 19 CHAIRMAN BENSE: That's an inside story.
- 20 MR. HOGAN: And currently the tax collector
- in Duval County and it's an honor to be among this
- 22 group. Thank you.
- 23 SENATOR HARIDOPOLOS: Mr. Chair, great to see

- you again. Senator Mike Haridopolos. I represent
- District 26 in the Florida Senate. I also served

as the Senate finance and tax chairman, and we had
the honor to go around our great state the last
two weeks to 14 town hall meetings and 60 hours of
testimony trying to work on that property tax

And however we can help in the Legislature we are ready, willing, and able to help.

MS. BARNETT: Thank you, members of the commission and Mr. Chair. I am Martha Barnett.

I'm, lived in Tallahassee the last 26 years. I'm a native Floridian, a lawyer with the law firm of Holland and Knight. I feel in some ways like this is a reunion of old friends because a number of us served on the first taxation and budget reform commission. I had the privilege to do that and I'm looking forward to, to this experience.

But really glad to be a part of the team.

MS. MATHIS: Mr. Chairman. Mr. Chairman, my name is Jacintha Mathis. I'm a real estate lawyer and specialize in working with emerging businesses and faith-based organizations and helping them do community revitalization and economic development. And I have served on the constitution revision commission with some of the illustrious people

- here, and I am honored to serve you with on this
- commission.

1	MR. MCKAY: Mr. Chairman, members of the
2	commission, pleasure to be here with you-all
3	today. My name is John McKay. I am a Bradenton
4	businessman in the real estate business. Used to
5	be president of the Senate, was there for 12
6	years. I look forward to working with all of
7	you-all, and congratulations on your election or
8	affliction.

9 (Laughter.)

MR. MCKEE: Mr. Chairman, my name is Bob

McKee. I'm currently for the past ten years been

the tax collector of Lake County. Prior to that I

was a county and city administrator. And I am

very much looking forward to working with some

private sector folks.

MR. MILLER: Mr. Chair, my name is Randy
Miller. It's a pleasure to be here. I am
currently the executive vice president of Florida
Retail Federation. A little history. 27 years
ago Senator Margolis was a representative and in
this very room we did a lot of ad valorem tax
reform. Back then the complaint was the tax rolls
were too low. So I served nine years with

- Department of Revenue and we moved it right on up,
- 25 didn't we?

1	(Laughter.)
2	Anyway, it's a pleasure to be here and I
3	look forward to working with you and the
4	members of the commission.
5	MR. MOORE: Mr. Chairman, my name is Jade
6	Moore. I'm the executive director of the Pinellas
7	Classroom Teachers' Association in Pinellas
8	County. My family has lived in Pinellas County
9	since 1953. I formerly was a speech and English
10	teacher in the Pinellas County school system and
11	have been honored to have been previously
12	appointed on the sales tax revision commission
13	with Ms. Barnett and Mr. Miller. Our work is well
14	remembered in the State of Florida, I'm sure.
15	It's a pleasure to be here.
16	REPRESENTATIVE PETERMAN: Mr. Chairman,
17	former speaker, good seeing you again. I am
18	Representative Frank Peterman out of
19	St. Petersburg, Florida. I served in several
20	capacities. I serve as a pastor of a church in
21	St. Petersburg and also serve as a development
22	director for a nonprofit organization.

MS. RILEY: Mr. Chairman, my name is Nancy

- 24 Riley, and I am a licensed real estate agent for
- 25 34 years. I'm a realtor. I'm from the governor's

1	hometown of Pinellas County. And this year I am
2	the president of the largest trade association in
3	the State of Florida. I am president of the
4	Florida Association of Realtors, 170,000 members.
5	
6	MR. ROUSON: Mr. Speaker, my name Darryl
7	Rouson. I'm the senior partner and founder of the
8	largest African-American owned law firm in
9	Pinellas County, Florida. I'm not sure why I'm
10	here when I hear the credentials of all these
11	others folks, except to say that I have not done
12	much inside government.
13	But my mission is to make complex things
14	simple for the common person, and to that
15	extent I love the State of Florida. I
16	appreciate the mission of this commission. I
17	intend to serve fully and to help this
18	commission reach its aims for the people of the
19	State of Florida. Thank you.
20	MR. SCOTT: Mr. Chair, I am an attorney,
21	Tripp Scott, a law firm in Fort Lauderdale. And
22	thank you, by the way, for making me vice chair.
23	And just as long as you understand that Allan is

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24 doing all the work.25 (Laughter.)
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T	No. But seriously I served on the
2	constitution revision commission with some of
3	the folks here, Martha Barnett and others. And
4	before that I was a county commissioner and for
5	a number of years before that I was in the
6	Senate for 24 years. President of the Senate.
7	I was elected when I was 15 to the Senate.
8	(Laughter.)
9	But it's really a great group. I'm really
10	proud to be a part of this group and I know
11	it's going to be very important work and very
12	important subject.
13	MS. STORY: Mr. Chairman and fellow
14	commissioners, I'm Susan Story, and I am president
15	and CEO of Gulf Power Company which is in
16	northwest Florida. I have been very involved in
17	economic development throughout the state, serving
18	as vice chair of Enterprise Florida for the past
19	two years, and am also involved in a lot of
20	different business and education efforts
21	throughout the State of Florida.
22	MR. TURBEVILLE: Mr. Chairman, it's a
23	pleasure to be here. I am Greg Turbeville and I

- 24 am currently a Tallahassee resident and currently
- 25 a governmental consultant.

1	Prior to that I worked in the executive
2	office of the governor under Governor Bush and
3	then previously before that I worked here in
4	the Florida House of Representatives. And I
5	appreciate the governor and Legislature
6	dedicating a lot of time to lowering taxes on
7	Floridians, and they have done a very good job
8	so far in making that a central and focal point
9	of the session.
10	MR. WILKINSON: Fellow commissioners, I'm Ken
11	Wilkinson, Lee County property appraiser, elected
12	in 1980, and consider this certainly a highlight
13	of my career and I really appreciate the
14	opportunity to be a part of this. Thank you.
15	MR. YABLONSKI: Mr. Chairman and
16	commissioners, my name is Brian Yablonski, and I
17	am vice president of St. Joe Company. We own a
18	little bit of land in beautiful northwest Florida.
19	And I am also a commissioner on the Florida Fish
20	and Wildlife Conservation Commission.
21	CHAIRMAN BENSE: How about on who is on
22	the phone? Barney Barnett, are you still on the
23	phone?

MR. BARNETT: I am.

25 CHAIRMAN BENSE: Why don't you go through

1	your resume as well?
2	MR. BARNETT: Okay. My name is Barney
3	Barnett and I'm with Publix Super Markets in
4	Lakeland, Florida. I was fortunate enough to
5	serve with Martha and Mark Bostick on the first
6	taxation and reform commission. I'm happy that
7	Martha is on the organizational committee because
8	she can give a lot of insight into what did and
9	didn't work. And we are really blessed to have
10	two great leaders in Allan and Jim, and so I'm
11	looking forward to the whole process.
12	CHAIRMAN BENSE: Who else is on the phone?
13	MR. BOSTICK: Mark Bostick.
14	CHAIRMAN BENSE: Hey, Mark.
15	MR. BOSTICK: I'm working for Comcar
16	Industries and already mentioned served on the
17	first commission and pleased to serve again.
18	CHAIRMAN BENSE: Anybody else on the
19	telephone call?
20	(No response.)
21	All right. We also have with us the
22	Honorable Sandy D'Alemberte. We're going
23	through introducing ourselves, Sandy, so tell

- us about yourself. Punch that left button
- 25 there.

1	MR. D'ALEMBERTE: First of all, I'm tardy and
2	I apologize. But there was a memorial service for
3	an old friend. It was already scheduled when this
4	meeting was called so I asked myself whether Ida
5	Snyder would want me to go to this organizational
6	session or her memorial service, and she would
7	have wanted me to come to this session, and that
8	was the very reason that I thought I ought to be
9	at her memorial service.

(Laughter.)

CHAIRMAN BENSE: Tell us a little bit about yourself.

MR. D'ALEMBERTE: My background is I am a lawyer. I practiced law for some time, came to the Legislature, served in the Florida House of Representatives from 1966 to 1972. I chaired a committee call the ad valorem taxation committee, which we no longer have. Thank goodness, because nobody has the pain of chairing such a committee, although there may be some other kinds of pain around these days I understand.

When I left the Legislature I returned to practice in Dade County and came back to

24	Tallahassee in 1984 to become dean of the FSU
25	college of law. Served a term before young

1	Martha Barnett came along as president of the
2	American Bar Association. And then in 1993
3	became president of Florida State University,
4	actually taking office in 1994 and serving for
5	nine years.
6	And that's where I got to know a young
7	Allan Bense as a freshman legislator, an FSU
8	graduate who continued on to do great works.
9	CHAIRMAN BENSE: You're kind. Did we get
10	everyone?
11	My name is, I am Allan Bense as we all
12	know and I'm from Panama City and I'm a
13	businessman. I'm in the construction business
14	and the road building business and mechanical
15	contracting business and golf course business
16	and a few others. But all those combined are
17	about 1/100th of Barney Barnett's, wherever
18	Barney is, business. So anyway I'm proud to be
19	here today, proud to serve with some really,
20	really successful people on this commission.
21	And once again thank you for selecting me
22	as chairman.

I think we also have with us today Pat

24	Gleason with the executive office of the
25	governor to give us a review of requirements of

1	the Sunshine Law. I think after that we will
2	hear from Phil Claypool who runs the commission
3	on ethics to tell us what we can do and can't
4	do from that perspective.
5	So, Pat, if you would, you're recognized.
6	MS. GLEASON: Thank you very much,
7	Mr. Chairman. It's really a pleasure to be here,
8	and actually as I was sitting back there listening
9	to the introductions I was reminded of the fact
10	that in 1990 I addressed the first taxation and
11	budget reform commission about the Sunshine Law,
12	and it was a very unusual experience because I
13	talked about it for about 20 minutes and the
14	various requirements and then at the end the
15	Honorable Ralph Haben said, well, Pat, the
16	Sunshine Law doesn't apply to us, does it, because
17	we're a constitutionally created commission.
18	At which point I said, well, the spirit of
19	the law applies. And the commission at that
20	time indicated and put into its by-laws that
21	the Sunshine Law would apply.
22	Since that time though it's interesting

that the people of the State of Florida put the

24	is Sunshine Law into the constitution and
25	expressly provided that the open meetings

provision would apply to constitutionally created commissions like this one.

so the brief discussion that I'll give about the Sunshine Law hopefully will help as the commission begins its important work. And to me the, I really don't have to, it appears spend a great deal of time on the requirements of the Sunshine Law because in my view they are so easy with respect to a commission like this.

The courts have said that the Sunshine Law applies to any meeting of a constitutionally created commission like this one, and the term meeting is defined to mean any gathering of two or more members of the board when they meet to discuss any matter on which foreseeable action may be taken.

So that means essentially no private discussions. All discussions must take place in open meetings like this one. There are no legislative created exemptions that would appear to apply to these deliberations. So it would seem as though from this point on all gatherings would be open, no private telephone

- conversations, no private discussions about
- 25 board business.

1	All of the proceedings would be open. So
2	having said that I'm happy to take any
3	questions that you might have.
4	(Laughter.)
5	CHAIRMAN BENSE: Any questions, members? Are
6	there questions? I think we've all been down this
7	road with the Sunshine Law before in this room.
8	Thank you very much.
9	MS. GLEASON: Thank you very much. It's a
10	pleasure.
11	CHAIRMAN BENSE: Let me see who else do we
12	have here. Phil Claypool, who is executive
13	director and general counsel of the Commission on
14	Ethics. He is going to discuss the ethical
15	requirements we will travel under and also
16	financial disclosure forms.
17	MR. CLAYPOOL: Thank you, Mr. Chairman and
18	congratulations to all of you, especially to the
19	two of you who are former members of my Commission
20	on Ethics.
21	Very briefly, because I know you've got
22	very important business to attend to today, we

provided you with a little brochure booklet

24	that's a guide to the Sunshine Amendment and
25	the code of ethics for public officers and

employees. It's sort of written in layman's
language is the guide to the provisions of the
code of ethics that are going to apply to all

4 of you.

I would like to talk just briefly about a couple of provisions in there and volunteer to come back at your wish if you would like me to address you in more detail about any particular questions.

In the front of the book is the contact information about how to get ahold of our organization. And so I would like to encourage you to hang on to that, because if you do have any questions about how the ethics laws may apply to you in this context I want to encourage you to give us a call, write us, get ahold of us somehow or another because we would be happy to provide you with whatever advice we can.

I know many of you currently hold public office and virtually all of you have held either public office or a high position in public employment, so you're acquainted

24	generally	with	the	ethi	.cs :	laws.	Ιc	of	want	to
25	emphasize	first	of	all	the	fact	that	- 3	you've	è

received financial disclosure forms. I believe those, if you haven't gotten them already they should have been sent out by the Secretary of State's office so they should be on their way.

If you already filed financial disclosure because you're in the Legislature for example or your tax collector or you currently hold some other public office, you do not have to file right now. But those of you who are not in another public position are required under state law to file that financial disclosure form within 30 days of your appointment.

Now, I know some of you may not be able to do that and the law allows our commission to give you an extension. And so, again, contact information is in front of the brochure. Give us a call. What we'll need is a written request for an extension.

My chairman can grant an extension of up to 45 days, and I know of at least one instance where we're likely to have to get on this and maybe a longer extension might be required.

That requires a vote of my commission to do

- that. So the sooner we can get to that
- business the sooner we'll be able to agenda

- that for consideration by the ethics
 commission.
- The code of ethics also contains a number

 of provisions that are meant to guard the

 interests of the people against conflicts of

 interest. One major area of that is gifts.

 And I have to tell you right now that I cannot

 give you any advice as to how the gift law is

 qoing to apply in your situation.

10 The reason for that is because of the new 11 lobbyist registration law and the zero 12 expenditure provision in there that bans 13 lobbyists from giving, from making any 14 expenditure on a, for example a member of the Legislature, and in the executive branch 15 prohibits an executive branch lobbyist from 16 giving a gift in essence to an officer of the 17 executive branch who files financial 18 19 disclosure.

I don't know what branch this commission sits in, and I'm here to tell you that the law does apply to the constitutional revision commission. That's because the Legislature had

- the foresight to put that body in the statute.
- 25 But this group is not in the statute.

1	So I'm here to request, and what we'll do
2	is get with your chairman an advisory opinion
3	request so we can iron this out as soon as
4	possible so we know what exactly the standards
5	are that you have to comply with.

Again, contact us, you know, if you have any questions about your personal situation. I only have a short time here to disorient you so I would invite you if you have any questions we would be happy to come back and address those at later time. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN BENSE: Thank you, Mr. Claypool, and we will, in the next week I want to have this ironed out. In the interim I would suggest you assume the worst. Assume that you follow the same guidelines that a member of the Florida House or Senate would fall under and act accord -- govern yourself accordingly. But I would suggest that you assume the worst and that -- I don't know who passed that legislation.

21 (Laughter.)

Okay. We're not going to go there. Are there any questions of Mr. Claypool? I'm

- 24 sorry. Any questions?
- Okay. Once again I want to make sure I

1	welcome your views on where you think this
2	commission should go between now and the next
3	commission meeting. If you have some ideas or
4	thoughts please let us know them at the
5	meeting. Hopefully we'll have an executive
6	director in place by then and parts of the
7	staff.

Anymore -- if you would, why don't you get
your Blackberries out and your note, your
calendars. I'm thinking that perhaps we go
ahead and meet in a month. That would be on
April the 15th. Is that a month from now,
April the 15th? Or April 13th.

MS. RILEY: That's a Sunday.

CHAIRMAN BENSE: We can go around the room and figure out what day is good for folks. It's a Friday. Everyone seemed to do a pretty good job of making it on a Friday. Is there an objection to having our meetings on a Friday? Seeing none, is there an objection to anyone -- I see no objections. Is there an objection to having it on Friday -- what would that be?

Friday the 13th? That's a lucky day. Are

- there any objections? Same time and station,
- 25 1 o'clock here in Tallahassee.

1	MS. BARNETT: How about an earlier morning
2	meeting?
3	CHAIRMAN BENSE: Is that best for everybody?
4	MS. BARNETT: Before noon?
5	CHAIRMAN BENSE: Some of you have distance
6	problems. Bobby?
7	MR. MARTINEZ: Mr. Bense, are we going to
8	have the opportunity to conference in by telephone
9	at these meetings?
10	CHAIRMAN BENSE: Yes. I would love to see
11	you eyeball to eyeball if possible, but naturally
12	sometimes you have issues that come up and
13	certainly I think it's worked fairly well today
14	with the folks that were on the telephone.
15	So, say we move it back, what, to
16	10 o'clock, Martha?
17	MS. BARNETT: Somewhere in there.
18	CHAIRMAN BENSE: Does anyone have objections
19	to starting in the morning, around 10:00 a.m.?
20	Are there any objections?
21	I'll entertain a motion then that the next
22	meeting of this commission be on Friday the
23	13th at 10:00 a.m. in this same room. Is there

- 24 a motion?
- MR. HOGAN: Motion.

1	CHAIRMAN BENSE: Is there a second?
2	MR. MCKAY: Second.
3	CHAIRMAN BENSE: Is there discussion? All in
4	favor say aye.
5	(Ayes unanimous.)
6	The motion carries. This group will meet
7	on Friday April 13th at 10 o'clock in this room
8	here.
9	Also, I will communicate with the members
10	of the organizational committee in the next,
11	probably by Monday afternoon, Monday night, to
12	find a place that we can all meet and a time we
13	can all meet that's acceptable to everyone. It
14	may even be by teleconference or by phone, but
15	we'll figure out a way to put it together.
16	I do want to tell you though that sort of
17	in closing, I think it's an obligation of this
18	commission to listen to a lot of public
19	testimony. I mean, there's a reason that the
20	framers of our constitution set this up.
21	So I intend to be proactive when it comes
22	to traveling around the state taking testimony

from people. I think we should hear what the

- 24 people have to say. And so be ready to do some
- work.

Any other -- any remarks? Nancy, you're 1 2 recognized. MS. RILEY: Mr. Chairman, if our contact 3 information is incorrect who would we give that 4 correction to before we leave here? 5 6 CHAIRMAN BENSE: Give it to me. 7 MR.
